D. R. FARQUHARSON HONORED.

A Warm Tribute to a Worthy Man.

The *Tilbury Times* of last week has four or five columns devoted to an account of a banquet in Valetta Town Hall in honor of D. R. Farquharson, brother of the Presbyterian pastor of this town. The occasion was his retirement from the position of Tp. Clerk of Tilbury East, held by him for 28 years—to take charge of the Customs office in Chatham, a position to which he was recently appointed by the present government.

The honor to Mr. Farquharson seems to have been as spontaneous as it was generous. Neither party, nor creed, nor race was recognized. The municipalities surrounding his own sent representatives, and speaker after speaker testified to the benefit of his example and the worth and wisdom of his counsel.

The *Times*, a good Conservative paper, by the bye—says "It was an eloquent tribute to a much beloved man." Banker Stewart, who was influential in securing him the position 25 years ago, said, "I have known a good many men in my time, but none have so favorably impressed me as Mr. Farquharson, who is worthy of every example." Collector Marshall, who had been closely associated with him, called him "one man in a thousand," and Clerk Wilson, of Tilbury said "the County of Kent was honored in appointing him as he had not asked for the position."

Herein lies the secret of the warm demonstration. He secured the office because the electors of the townships insisted on it. The old saying "Merit is ever modest" seems to have been fully exemplified in this case. For Mr. F. was never active in political lines; it was a clear case of the "office seeking the man," and as such is worthy of wide notice as an example to the many venial aspirants for position. It was stated as a fact that though Mr. F. was Tp. Clerk, Clerk of the Division Court, and Stenographer of the County Court he had never applied for an office in his life. In his reply he says "I never thought of the Customs office, it came to me,—my friends gave it to me,—but perhaps they used more force than I would have them do." Referring to the past he said "For many years as council followed council I wondered if I would be dismissed, but later I had more confidence in myself. I came to the township with only the education the parish schools of Scotland afford, and I leave the township whose growth and progress I have watched with pleasure, without a known enemy."

We congratulate the new Customs Collector whose life seems to have been an inspiration, and hope he may long enjoy the new position and that he will visit Durham some day. He entered upon his duties Feb. 10th, the position being worth \$1200 a year. He is succeeded in the clerkship by his younger brother Alex.
