

Stock-Taking Going On

Preliminaries Settled.

The conferences in progress as we went to press last week were concluded on Thursday last and the result is a most gratifying one we honestly believe to the town and district.

At a public meeting in the Town Hall the pros and cons of the steps already taken to push the works were all discussed with perfect frankness by many citizens of the town as well as by Mr. Cowham and his colleagues. Questions wore asked and answered and in the main satisfaction was expressed that the prospects of the National Portland Cement Co. were so good. A strong committee was formed, composed of Messrs H. Parker, John McKechnic, Jas. A. Hunter, Wm. Calder, Arthur Jackson and these in company with Mr. Gilbert McKechnie discussed with Mr Cowham questions of free site, exemption from taxation and other kindred matters.

The matter of making calls about which there was some uncertainty, was definitely settled by written agreement. The calls are not to be oftener than monthly nor more than 10 per cent.


