A NICE HONEST LOT.

The Provincial Government in Manitoba appears to be having troubles of its own and lots of them. First came the desertion of its head, who, after pledging himself to stay with the job of 'righting the wrongs inflicted by the corrupt Greenway Government, (save the mark), stepped out before his first year was over to court disaster in the federal arena, and now lies buried so deep under the Siftonian avalanche of last November that no one ever expects to hear of him again. The administration, thus crippled and reorganized, started in to evolve a railway policy, with the result that every solid business interest in the community is alarmed, and every effort is being put forward to save the credit of the Province, by the extreme means of securing the federal veto to the bill which was literally railroaded through the Local House. Now comes | Guelph, March 16th, 1901. a trouble more serious than any for it involves a question of common honesty and ordinary business integrity. The Government brought down a return to an order of the House purporting to contain the names of all civil employees who had been fired by the new Government since the beginning of last year, and of all the new appointments since that date. The list contained the names of thirty-eight dismissals, and fifty-two appointments; the Winnipeg Free Press now comes out with the straight charge that there were one hundred and eight dismissals, and a much larger number of appointments adding that "the Government is bringing down returns to which the terms 'suppression and falsification" would properly apply. A nice lot, that new Tory government, it is to be hoped that the people of Manitoba appreciate and enjoy the change from the straightforward administration they so lightly got rid of at the last elections.

-The men who have been gathering at Ottawa during the past month to go out to South Africa as a part of Baden Powell's Constabulary, will probably leave the capital for Halifax on Monday. There are nearly a thousand of them, as likely a looking lot of young stalwarts we are told as have been assembled in one organization in a long time.
