THE CENSUS.

This week 38 enumerators are on the road taking the census of South Grey, and we sincerely hope that in the performance of this national duty they will be cordially assisted in every home, and every facility given them to make their work satisfactory and complete.

The ground covered and questions asked are very extensive, and taken individually some may appear trifling. In the aggregate however, as a country or a nation, the result is of great value and no item, however small should be omitted. We hope heads of families will lend every assistance in their power to enumerators so that the work may be of the highest value.

Coming at the same time as the assessor some will likely have the taxation idea in their minds. This should be entirely thrown aside, and no reserve exercised in giving full information. Enumerators are sworn to secrecy, none of the facts obtained will ever appear in detail, they will be lumped by municipalities or districts thus entirely eliminating any personal element.

If son, daughter, or other member of your home is absent but intending to return, they will be entered with the family, but the enumerator will enter their present location—if in Canada—on a special sheet, which, at Ottawa, will enable them to prevent duplication.

The act as to secrecy reads:—Every officer or other person employed in any capacity on census is required to keep inviolate the secrecy of the information gathered by the enumerators and entered on the schedules or forms. An enumerator is not permitted to show schedules to any other person, nor to make or keep a copy of them, nor to answer any question respecting their contents directly or indirectly; and the same obligation of secrecy is imposed upon commissioners and other officers or employees of the outside service, as well as upon every officer, clerk or other employee of the census office at Ottawa. The facts and statistics of the census may not be used except for statistical compilations, and positive assurance is to be given on this if a fear is entertained by any person that they may be used for taxation or any other object.
