Enumerators are sworn to secrecy, none of the facts obtained will ever appear in detail, they will be lumped by municipalities or districts thus entirely eliminating any personal

If son, daughter, or other member of your home is absent but intending to return, they will be entered with the family, but the enumerator will enter their present location—if in Canada on a special sheet, which, at Ottawa, will enable them to prevent dupli-

The act as to secrecy reads:-Every officer or other person employed in any capacity on census is required to keep inviolate the secrecy of the information gathered by the enumerators and entered on the schedules or forms.

An enumerator is not permitted to show schedules to any other person, nor to make or keep a copy of them, nor to make or keep a copy of them, nor to visited friends on the avenue last week. answer any question respecting their contents directly or indirectly; and the same obligation of secrecy is imposed upon commissioners and other officers or employes of the outside service, as well as upon every officer, clerk or other employe of the census office at Ottawa.
