ARTEMESIA COUNCIL

Saturday was a warm day for the township council, there being no less than three delegations before that body. The most important of these was a delegation with a long petition asking for the formation of a new school section out of parts of sections 6, 9, and 13, and a counter delegation which energetically opposed the scheme. Arguments pro and con were listened to and the matter held over for next meeting. Communications were read from Clarke, Neelson & Co. asking privilege to build a platform on road allowance, and from the revee of Euphrasia re-appointment of committee to investigate complaint of John Fadden.

A petition was read from Donald McMillan and others asking council to open a portion of town line between Glenelg and Artemesia.

Muir-Gibson—That Thos. Lander be paid \$8.45 for registering deed and by-law 582. Carried.

Muir-Boyd—That the clerk be paid \$25.80 for registering 129 births, marriages and deaths. Carried.

Thompson-Muir—That upon Wm. Meads and Joseph Oliver making a good title and giving possession of deviation for road in lieu of 30 side road in con. I. N. D. R., they be paid as follows: W. Mead, \$75, and Jos. Oliver, \$100, they to give possession at once and the money to be paid when work is completed, they to agree to remove fence off centre of said sideroad by May 1st, 1901, said compensation being for land and allowance for extra fencing. Carried.

Boyd-McTavish—That the Reeve close contracts with W. H. Thurston in accordance with his offer, \$71, for printing auditors' reports 1900, voters' lists for 1901, and 1200 tax receipts. Advertising to be 8 and 2 cents a line. Carried.

Boyd-Thompson—The following names be substituted for persons appointed pathmasters, who declined to act: Alfred Thistlewait instead of Chas. Irwin, Arch. Neilson instead of John Wright, Thos. Irwin instead of S. Boyd. Carried.

Thompson-Boyd—That the bill of W. H. Thurston for furnishing one thousand assessment notes at 50c per 100, \$5, be paid. Carried.

Boyd-Thompson—That Messrs. Clark, Neelson & Co. be granted the privilege of placing platform on road allowance between their mill and the bridge at Eugenia in order to better enable them to get their manufactured goods out of mill, so long as the same does not interfere with any public or private interests in doing so, and that the said parties hold themselves responsible for any damages which may occur during their occupancy of said road. Carried.

Boyd-Thompson—That W. J. Bellamy be paid the sum of \$7.87, being amount due for postage for 1900 and up to date. Carried.

Gibson-Muir—That the question of forming a new school section out of parts of sections, 8, 9 and 13, having been fully discussed, the matter be on the table until the next regular meeting of this council, to be then finally disposed of. Carried.

Boyd-Thompson—That the petition of D. McMillan and 38 others, asking that townline opposite lots 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, 3rd south D. H., be opened up for winter travel, be entertained, and that the revee arrange a meeting with the revee of Proton with a view of having road opened. Carried.

Council adjourned.

FROM SPOKANE

According to promise we give an extract from an interesting letter from Mr. Batson who is now settled in Spokane, Washington. He narrates some thrilling experiences on snow-bound trains last November while going West on the G. Northern R. R. near summit point in the Rockies. The prairies in the winter are "most tiresome, no fences, no forests, no scenery, nothing to arrest the attention or to interest one on the journey." He arrived at Baker City but a short distance there "hoped it to be quite uncongenial, the conditions being entirely new to him. Building operations and all business goes on Sunday as usual. Twenty or thirty drinking saloons in a city under ten thousand. Houses of ill fame flourishing under a monthly fines system which practically amounts to a license, for due calculation is made for this revenue in the civic estimates. In contrast to this is his experience at the Sagamore Hotel.

"The proprietor is a Mr. Carlyle, formerly a school teacher from Ontario, and a very autocrat too. He runs a first class hotel, everything clean and comfortable, and the table fare varied and excellent in matter of quality and service. No liquor sold—no bar in conjunction. The other, or leading Hotel of the place has a bar. Carlyle claims that he can run a hotel-business successfully without selling liquor, and that in hotels having the bar the guests are favored according as they patronize or abstain from patronizing the bar."

Mr. Batson went in November, came east for his wife and baby boy in January, and through February tried house-keeping in furnished rooms for a month rent \$24 in advance! They changed this however for unfurnished rooms at \$15 a month and he is having better accommodation at very money.

"Spokane is a very picturesque city on the Spokane River, and as the Falls of the City, a good view is had from the several bridges crossing the River connecting the Northern and Southern parts of the City. The population is about 45,000 and growing rapidly. The surrounding hills and the River Valley abound in natural scenery, a drive through which is most enjoyable. Two weeks ago March 16th, Mrs. Batson and I were out about a mile or so from the settled limits of the City and the sides of the hills coming down to the road were sprinkled with buttercups and other varieties of wild flowers. Spring opening out here much earlier than at home in Ontario. Eggs are down to 20 cents a doz, and butter is now 25c a lb, which is quite a reduction from Feb. prices, which were 35c for butter and 30c for eggs. Potatoes are sold by weight at 1c a pound, or 100 lbs for 90c, which is about the same as 90c a bag in the east. You see produce is higher here than in Grey County. I got milk in February at 14 quarts for a \$1.00 now at 16 quarts, and from May to November I am promised 18 quarts, which is the lowest it goes."
