SHOULD MINISTERS SMOKE. - A case will be heard at the court of appeal of the Methodist church at Toronto is that of the wording of the discipline of the ministers of that body, which makes the letter of the discipline of no effect in convicting a minister of smoking. Mr. Justice Williams laid a case before the chairman of the Victoria District against Rev. W. W. Baer for using tobacco contrary to the discipline. The chairman of the district, Rey. J. C. Sneer, rulled that the paragraph cited in the case did not apply to ordained ministers. Technically, these paragraphs did not apply, and the case was thrown out on that ground. Mr. Williams appealed to Rev. Mr. Whittington president of the British Columbia Conference, who sustained the ruling of the chairman, and now the court is dealing with the matter, not the merits of the case, as to whether the man arranged should have smoked or not but upon the wording of the discipline. another hearing will be given the case by court of appeal,


