LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

Mr. and Mrs. Eadie, the latter a daughter of Mr. Richard Banks, Glenelg, arrived in town on Monday evening, with the body of their youngest daughter who died in Greenwood. The child was buried in Zion graveyard. The sorrowing parents have our sympathy.

Mr. J. K. Hamilton, veterinary specialist, had a peculiar experience at Mr. M. Mulloy's, last week. One of Mr. Mulloy's cows was about to calve, and displayed unfavorable symptoms. Mr. Hamilton was summoned and delivered her of a calf, the equal of which we are sure has never been in this section. Everything seemed to be reversed. The ribs extended from back bone the opposite way, exposing on the outside the intestines, stomach, heart, lungs etc. while the skin and hair lay on the inside. The head and legs were also enclosed. —Star.

LICENSE COMMISSIONERS.—Annual Meeting of the Board was held on Tuesday in Durham having been postponed from Holstein. We must save space by stating that the hotels licensed this year are the same as last, with the very notable exception that the Muddaugh House of this town has been granted license only for three months, at the end of which time the license is to be withdrawn unless some much needed improvement is made in the sanitary surroundings, a defective roof etc. This is astonishing news and we have no doubt the proprietor, Mrs. Irwin, will at once see that the fine hostelry is made up-to-date.

THE BIBLE IN THE SCHOOLS.—The public school section of the Ontario Educational Association has passed a resolution in favor of the introduction of the Bible as a text book in the school. This causes the Woodstock Express to remark and with considerable force, that if the teachers must teach the Bible, the public is entitled to demand that the teachers shall be qualified to teach it. The various religious denominations require long years of careful training from their ministers before accepting them as competent to teach. If the average school teacher is competent to take up the work without any training, then the only conclusion is that the religious denominations waste a lot of the valuable time of their ministers.

SHOULD MINISTERS SMOKE.—A case will be heard at the court of appeal of the Methodist church at Toronto is that of the wording of the discipline of the ministers of that body, which makes the letter of the discipline of no effect in convicting a minister of smoking. Mr. Justice Williams laid a case before the chairman of the Victoria District against Rev. W. W. Baer for using tobacco contrary to the discipline. The chairman of the district, Rev. J. C. Smeer, ruled that the paragraph cited in the case did not apply to ordained ministers. Technically, these paragraphs did not apply, and the case was thrown out on that ground. Mr. Williams appealed to Rev. Mr. Whittington president of the British Columbia Conference, who sustained the ruling of the chairman, and now the court is dealing with the matter, not the merits of the case, as to whether the man arranged should have smoked or not but upon the wording of the discipline. Another hearing will be given the case by court of appeal.

KING EDWARD.—The Toronto Star has published a portrait of King Edward VII, which reaches, we believe, the highest standard of lithography attainable on this continent. That this statement is not too strong will be admitted, we think, by those who see the work. The picture shows His Majesty in official uniform, with his decorations in their proper colors. As a piece of portraiture, it is the best obtainable—better than a photograph as all oil paintings by competent artists must be. The artistic value is heightened by a rich background, which increases in the print the effect of an oil painting. The gold of the uniform stands out upon the picture with striking richness. The picture is 18 inches by 24 inches, a convenient size for framing. The paper is one of the finest and heaviest quality. No expense has been spared in the work. The only cheap thing about it is its price. According to the price charged for some other pictures of King Edward which has been displayed in shop windows, this one is easily worth \$1, but the Star will send it in a strong tube upon receipt of 15 cents in silver or stamps.

On "big" days when we decorate with evergreens, how we all wisely remark how nice it looks, pity it was not the way all the time, and so on. Now is the time to have it so: let us plan for the coming years and no council or councilman will lose a vote if they would take steps to have the hill on both sides, opposite town property at least, planted this week or next. We cannot work at this all summer and civic pride prompts us to offer this suggestion of a much needed improvement. Now who will father it?

GOOD NEWS FOR FARMERS.—A gentleman named Mr. Ramsden, representing The National Federation of Meat Traders in England is at present on a tour of Canada and the States. He is reputed to be well posted on the question of meat and meat markets, and we give part of an interview with him by a Toronto Star reporter which goes to show that Britain may lift the embargo on Canadian cattle going into Britain.

Part of the interview was as follows: "What are the chances, Mr. Ramsden, of the present embargo on our Canadian cattle being removed?" asked Mr. Crawford. "I think we have a pretty clean bill of health." "Undoubtedly you have. Most undoubtedly," reiterated Mr. Ramsden, "I have reasons for believing that the embargo is in a good way for being removed, though it may take a little time. Our association is in very close touch with the great agricultural associations in England—the Royal Agricultural and the Smithfield Association, of which His Majesty King Edward the Seventh is honorary president you know. His Majesty was President as the Prince of Wales you will remember. Well, we meet with these associations, and we are impressing upon them that it is against the best interests of the British cattle trade to continue to mulct the Canadian trade with the high duty imposed by the United States in passing through to Great Britain.

"Besides that, Britain never before was under such an obligation to her greatest colony, Canada, as she is at the present time. We realize that and if for no other reason, the present embargo should be removed. I believe in fact that something will be done before very long."

Mr. Ramsden's assurances on this point were received with a good deal of satisfaction by the cattleman present.
