Toronto.

The run of cattle at the Western Cattle Market to-day was small, but there was a good demand and the offerings were fats. quickly sold. Prices held steady and in some classes buyers refused to do business because they could not afford to pay the prices asked by holders. Good cattle were scarce and the lew that were offered tound ready buyers at top prices. Exporters were less active, with prices steady. Good to picked butchers' were strong and in keen demand. The receipts of medium to merror butchers' were comparatively large and they were inclined to urag. Buns were quiet and unchanged. Feeders held steady, with a good inquiry for shortkeep. Medium and light were mactive, with light offerings, Milch cows were dull and there was an active demand for choice animals. Sheep. lambs, calves and hogs were unchanged. The total run was 53 loads, including 600 cattle, 39 sheep and tambs, 62 calves and 223 hogs.

Export Cattle-Cables report disappointing sales at Glasgow and export uealers are hoping that Liverpool and London will show a relative imprevement. One buyer said prices were advancing here, while they were declining in the old seiling too high in Toronto. One lead of particularly choice steers sold at \$5,25, but the range of the general market was about steady at \$4,75 to \$5,15 for choice and \$4,85 to \$4,75 for medium, including light weights. The demand was fairly active, but there were not many good cattle to be had. The approach of the Try our seasen of navigation is partly responsible for the activity, as shippers are arranging to fill the space they have taken. Some buyers have already purchased as many cattle as they need, and will do no more business until after navigation opens Butchers' Cattle-Several buyers were after picked lots and were prepared to pay as high as \$4,40 if they obtained the right quality. 
