THE CENSUS

The last book of the 38 enumerators of South Grey, was handed in to our office on Tuesday of this week and the count is complete as far as an honest effort on the part of all concerned made possible.

For the first time in any Canadian Census an attempt has been made to ascertain the proportions of the population born in rural or in urban district and its value is not so great now as it will be in 1911 when conclusions can be drawn as to the movement to or from the country and this knowledge is of great value to statesmen whose duty it is to examine into any movement whose tendencies may possibly be injurious.

Much expressed indignation is being uttered by Conservatives because industries employing less than five hands are not enumerated on the special schedule. But it should be remembered that the number of manufacturing establishments are taken account of and if, as feared, there should appear to be a falling off since 1901, the explanation can be truthfully given that the enumeration of industries in '91 was little better than a farce, since even in some cases washerwomen were returned amongst the industries.

While the duties have been arduous and exating where faithful works has been done, it has not been without a touch of humor and many are the stories told of amusing experiences and tactful devices in the prosecution of the work.

The results obtained are more valuable than might at first sight appear. Taking one man's enumeration only, it is possible to be a long way out, taking 10 men, the error will be nearer the truth, and taking 10,000 men the average will be still nearer, and will practically furnish a basis on which to build calculations.

The oldest enumerator was Mr. Malcolm McPhee, of Normandy, who has lived through 8 census years and remembers 7 of them, viz., from 1841 onwards. The oldest person we heard of was Mr. McPhee's father who was 109 years old last June.

The work has been so sincere, as we can testify, and we hope the results obtained over all Canada will be gratifying to our national pride and worth the expenditure which will approximate to half a million dollars.

The Council met April 18th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The tree in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

By-Law No. 404, fixing remunerations for members of Council, Committees and Road Commissioners was introduced and read a first and second time.

McCannel—McInnis—That a cheque be issued on Treasurer for the sum of \$409.81 being voucher for orders given by Mr Staples white reeve of Glenelg for work done at Glencross bridge in 1900. Car.

Arrowsmith—McCannel—That Shewell and Lenahan be paid \$8 for coffin for the late Samuel McArthur, that being the usual amount paid. Carried.

McCannel—McInnis—That Alex Bell be paid \$25 on salary as Assessor. Car.

McCannel—Davis—That Thos Lander be paid \$2.75 for Registration scriebes, relative to Treasurer's scriebes for T. J. of Glenelg, also Robt Braithwaite \$11.25 for 7 1/2 cords of wood for Mrs Dillon, and G. Lawrence \$1.90 for 100 lbs flour for Mrs. Dillon. Carried.

Davis—Arrowsmith—That the Municipal World be paid \$1.00 for legal service, and that witness fees be paid as follows: J. S. Black \$2.10, R. T. Edwards \$1.80, Jas Staples \$1.40 and Thos McFadden \$1.00 relative to McInnis suit. Carried.

McCannel—Davis—That G. L. McCaul be paid for conducting suit for incorporation of Glenelg. Carried.

McCannel—McInnis—That A. McCaulin be paid \$2.10 for gravel for 1900 as certified to by pathmaster. Carried.

McCannel—McInnis—That By-law 404 fixing remuneration of members of municipal Council be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on By-law book. Carried.

Arrowsmith—McInnis—That the account of J. Ramage for Printing Auditors reports amounting to \$10.08 be paid. Car.

Arrowsmith—McCannel—That the reeve and Clerk be a committee to wait on the Treasurer re his Communication and other matters connected with this Council and report at next meeting. Carried. The Council adjourned.
