"Five Years of My Life, 1894 to his papers in 1896, and was never 1899," the English translation of Captain Dreyfus' autobiographic history of the famous affair with which his name is forever linked, is published in England and America simulsaneously with the appearance of the original in France. Captain Dreyfus describes from first to last the inner workings of the great events with which he was associated. The story of the degradation acquires a new and vivid interest when told by the sufferer himself. This took place on Saturday, January 5, 1895. Dreyfus was marched to the centre of the square under a guard of four men and a corporal. Let him now take up the thread of the narrative.

## Wife's Farewell Kiss Refused.

Captain Dreyfus was first confined in the prison at the lie de Re. Here he was allowed to write to and occadonally receive visits from his wife. On February 21st he saw that devoted woman for the last time until his restoration. That was the day set for his transportation to Devil's Island, one of the Isles du Salut (Isles of Health, a woful misnomer !)

"She asked that they tie her hands behind her back and let her approach and kies me. The director gave a rough refusal. After the interview, which was from two to three o'clock, I was suddenly told that I must get ready for my departure, without either of us having been previously informed. The preparations consisted in making a bundle of my clothes." As soon as he reached the Saint-Nazaire they placed him in one of several convicts' cells on the forward deck, which were closed by a simple grating. The part of the deck in front of these cells was uncovered. The night was dark and the cold fearful, nearly 14 degrees Centigrade below zero (about 7 degrees Fahrenheit). Only a hammock was thrown to him, and he was left without food.
