A RECORD TO BE PROUD OF.

Although Mr. Marter says there are no politics in Ontario matters, some members of the Conservative party have been trying to import Dominion issues into provincial affairs. Outside the explicit differences between provincial and federal jurisdictions laid down in the British North America Act, it has always been felt in this province that men had the right to have distinct opinions on the two Governments, and elections in the past have proven that to be so. A Liberal Government it must be remembered, held power in Ontario during the 18 years that the Conservatives managed things at Ottawa. It was only when the Conservative Administration at Ottawa exposed its incapacity that Canada turned round and gave the other fellows the chance which they have so nobly fulfilled. The Liberal Government of Ontario still retains its reputation for prudent, progressive administration and is entitled to another lease of the public confidence. It has distributed the burden of taxation more equably. It has dealt generously with the public services. It has encouraged industrial and agricultural expansion. It has placed education abreast of the times. It has established the succession duties, by which wealth pays a bigger toll to the community where it was made. It has supplied every just demand, and, after all the accounts are balanced, it can show a substantial surplus.

Some misinformed people protest that Ontario is Conservative, and that the Dominion election last year proves it. A study of the figures reveals the hollowiness of this argument. In the Legislature there are 52 Liberals, 41 Conservatives and West Huron vacant. In the last Dominion election the votes cast in the constituency-if provincial boundaries had been in force-would have given 50 Liberals and 44 Conservatives. The Dominion gerrymander, the work of the Conservative Administration at Ottawa, left the Liberals of the province with 39 representatives in the House of Commons. In addition to the 50 ridings which, in the Dominion vote, would have gone Liberal by provincial boundaries, 11 other ridings were carried by the Liberals in the provincial election of 1898. Thus in 1898 and 1900, 61 of the 94 ridings of this province went Liberal at one time or another. Besides these, there are 11 ridings in which party schisms lost the election to the Liberals in 1900. These schisms do not exist as far as provincial matters are concerned, and they may be expected to come back and return supporters of the Ross Government. The Liberals are out for 75 for Ross. The figures are encouraging, and the record of the Ross Government and the ability of its members will help to make them a reality.

A RADICAL MOVE.—Clergymen of the Church of England are looking with more than ordinary interest to the coming session of the Synod of the diocese of Niagara, to be held in Hamilton in June. It promises to be the most important session held in many years. There is a proposition on foot which if adopted will bring about a radical change in connection with the service of the aged ministers. It is, in effect, to provide for the retirement of any clergyman who, in the opinion of the powers that be, has passed the time at which he can give the best service to the church. At the present time a clergyman can retain a church as long as he lives, if he desires, and a number of churches are pointed to, once prosperous and vigorous, which have been going backwards because, it is said, their rectors fail to see that they are too old to keep up the work and hold the congregation together, or if they see the fact they retain the rectories rather than give up the stipend. Strong opposition to the proposed measure is anticipated.—Brantford Express.

LAND SEEKERS' EXCURSION.

To accommodate the large number of people who have intimated their desire to acquire land in the newer agricultural districts of the Province, the Commissioner of Crown Lands has arranged with the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Lumsden Steamboat Company to run a special fifteen day colonist excursion to Temiskaming at a very low rate of fare. Excursionists may take any C. P. R. train on Tuesday, May 28, 1901, in time to connect with regular train leaving Carleton Junction at 2.40 on the morning of Wednesday, May 29th.

Special colonist sleeping cars will be provided at Carleton Junction for the accommodation of the excursionists on their arrival from other points. These cars will be ready for occupation at 9 p. m., May 28th.

The excursion will leave Carleton Junction at 2.40 in the morning, arriving at Mattawa at 7.40 a. m., in time for breakfast. From there a special train will run to Temiskaming Station, where connection will be made with the steamer for Haileybury and Thornloe. Passengers may board the special train either at the regular station at Mattawa at 9.05 a. m. or at the "Town Hall" stopping place.

Meals may be had on the steamer if desired. If passengers wish to take their food, baskets holding same should not be over 2 feet long, 18 inches wide and 11 inches high, so they can be placed under car seats when not in use.

The Lumsden Steamboat Company have fitted up a large houseboat for sleeping quarters which will be moored at Thornloe for a few days. There will be no spring beds or hair mattresses but the "floating hotel" will be warmed, clean and comfortable.

The tickets will be good for fifteen days affording ample time to thoroughly inspect the country. At Thornloe Mr. Armstrong, the Crown Lands Agent, will have guides in readiness to conduct those in search of land.

It will be understood that there are no stage coaches and excursionists will need to take their walking boots.

The Director of Colonization will accompany the excursion and will endeavor to see that the excursionists are made as comfortable as possible.

Tickets may be obtained at C. P. R. Stations only upon presenting a certificate from the Director of Colonization. Parties living off the line of the C. P. R. will have to pay cost of transportation to nearest C. P. R. Station.

The railway tickets will be good to Temiskaming Station only where tickets for the boat may be had. The boat rate will be \$2.00 for return ticket. Fare from Mt Forest or Flesherton will be \$8.75.

Those desiring to go on this excursion are requested to apply to the undersigned for certificate at as early a date as possible in order that suitable accommodation may be arranged for.

Do not forget that it is necessary in order to take advantage of the excursion rate to procure a certificate, which, with other information, may be had from THOMAS SOUTHWORTH, Director of Colonization, Parliament Edges Toronto.
