BINDER TWINE PRICE.

The Ontario Government fixes it a

Secretary, and the Inspector of Prisons have decided upon the price (8 cents per pound) at which farmers can be supplied with binder twine from the Ontario Central Prison for the season of 1901. Heretoforce it has been the practice of binder-twine manufacturers to ship in ordinary jute bags, which were useless to the farmer after the twine was received, and the lashings, of loosely twisted tow, were also useless after their temporary Bring your wives and daughters and purpose was served. The weight of these sacks and lashings was six per cent of the weight of the bale.

But this is now changed as regards the twine from the Central Prison, and there will be no six per cent. loss to the farmer. The twine will hereafter be shipped in two-bushel, 16-oz. cotton grain bags of excellent quality, which will be of permanent use to the farmer, as will also the lashings, which consist of twor9-feet rope halters, with snap and ring ready of use. The value of the grain bag is greater than an equal weight of twine, and the same applies to the halters. The twine balls are twelve to the bag-of a length of five hundred feet to the pound, and of uniform quality throughout.
