COUNTY COUNCIL.

FROM MARKDALE STANDARD. First Session on Monday evening - A Lengthy Programme outlined.

The first sittings of the June Session of Grey County Council was held in Marsh's hall, Markdale, on Monday evening last at seven o'clock.

Warden G. A. Brown, and Councillors Doyle, Harness, Pringle, McKinnon, Ries, Schenk, Allan, McArthur, Watson, Preston, McCoolman, Agnew, Brown and McDonald were present.

The minutes of the previous session were read and confirmed. Warden Brown then addressed the council.

The financial committee presented their report and recommended the payment of the various accounts presented.

As time went on it became more imperative that provision be made for the aged and infirm.

The Warden hoped the business of the council would progress harmoniously and quickly, and recommended procuring conveyances and while in the centre of the county take a drive through and examine some of the central townships.

The following communications were then read by the clerk - MacKay & Sampson, re settlement of Arnold Bros. case; Col. Campbell, asking for usual grant of \$500 to 31st regiment, and also an additional grant of \$200 to apply on debt on bank instruments.

Little, stationery, \$2.50; Turner & Co., ink, \$2.60; Miller, filing saws, \$1.43; R. P. Butchart, repairs at Co. buildings, \$63.64; John Harrison & Sons Co. lumber, \$6.61; R. J. Edgar toilet paper, \$2; Mr. Little, 500 tags, \$1; R. Breckenridge, unpainted brooms, \$1.50; Clerk of Kynephel, election expenses in Jan. last, \$84.30.

On motion the council adjourned until Tuesday at 2 p. m. TUESDAY AFTERNOON. Council met at two o'clock as per adjournment.

We had the pleasure of a conversation with Fred Hamilton the Globe S. African correspondent, and was inside of a tent looted by him from Cronje's laager.

The R. C. R. have a reunion tonight, Tuesday, in the mess of the 12th Regiment, it being centrally located.

The Y. M. C. A. left on Thursday for Kingston after performing a good work here with grand and attractive services. An address by Best, the Y. M. C. A. representative with the Mounted Rifles in Africa on 'How the Canadians saved the Guns,' was fine and met with well-merited applause.

Two courts-martial have been held in our regiment and strange to say was a sergeant in each case: one for refusal to do duty as a marker, the other for stealing a pie! The first from No 2 had his stripes taken from him, the other, from No 3, confined to the barracks for 24 hours, besides a severe reprimand from the Col.

Several of our officers, including paymaster and surgeon and Lt. Rutherford of No. 8, took in the Buffalo show.

Rain on Wednesday and Thursday mornings prevented parade. Tuesday the men had till 10 a. m. in which to clean up, in the afternoon brigade drill was practiced. Extended order, supports 100 yds off, a miniature Paardeberg, minus the trenches, the noise of the death-dealing shot and shell, and the dead and wounded. The probabilities are we may get an invitation to Toronto in October to help welcome the Duke of York and party.

Friday - Military games were held last night, tent pegging, lemon slicing, &c. Wrestling on horseback by two teams of 5 each from Dragons and body guards was an exciting sport and ended 3 to 1 in favor of dragons.

After this and as they were moving to a leveler piece of ground for the tug of war on horseback, a frightful smash occurred. Some horsemen, having a race on their own account were galloping in opposite directions, and two of them came full tilt with their heads in collision, and fell dead in a heap, their necks being both broken. The riders were badly bruised and rendered unconscious, one of them being since reported dead. The writer was a witness of the tragic and sickening collapse. One of the horses was valued all the way from 250 to 800 dollars! and ran at the recent Woodbine races. The men, or rather boys, belonged to the Mounted Rifles, their horses being rented from \$1.50 to \$5.00 a day.

Friday a sham battle took place, which in some ways was more of a sham than usual. The Review on Wednesday was a grand spectacle, with the massed bands playing the different marches as they passed the saluting base.

No. 4 was detained at Niagara till 10.30 a. m. Saturday to assist in taking down tents, &c., reaching Toronto in time to catch the train however. Thus another camping season is over and the unburned recruit is home with new experiences of the preparation for a soldier's life.

The buying was not general; several dealers were out of the market altogether, and trade had a dull tone. Exporters were firmer and butchers' were easier.

Butchers' Cattle - The increasing proportion of grass cattle has weakened the market and prices are lower.

Feeders and Stockers - Market very quiet, with light offerings. Heavy feeders are not coming in and light stuff is too low in price to warrant large shipments.

Sheep and Lambs - Offerings fairly large and market steady. Prices are unchanged.

Calves - Good veals were in steady demand and the market was rather active. Prices were unchanged at \$1 to \$5.

Hogs - Deliveries large, and prices unchanged at \$7.12 1/2 per cwt, for select weights, \$6.87 1/2 for corn-fed, and \$6.62 1/2 for lights and fats.
