## How to Care For the Babies.

During the first year the child should, if passible, be nursed by the mother, but it should not be nursed every time it cries; never oftener than once is two hours in the day time, and once in four hours at night, are the directions given the Chicago American by a trained nurse.

A nursing mother should eat meat, eggs cered such as outmeal rice and hominy, and should drink plenty of water. But she should avoid strong tea, coffee, beer, unripe fruit and cabbage.

If the amount of milk is not sufficient to nourish the child, then resort to bottle feeding, but remember that bad bottle feeding leads to more deaths among the babies during summer than all other causes combined. This danger can be largely prevented if these rules are followed:
