MAKING WAR ON RATS

Oriental Cities Take This Way of Fighting the Plague.

Tacoma, Wash, despatch says: The steamship Hyson brings news that been killed by the authorities of Oriental cities as means to prevent the spread of the plague. In most cities premiums have been offered to persons who would bring in the largest number of rat tails within a specified time. At Tokio the rat catchers have received so much per head, and large sums have been paid out in this manner. Similar operations have been conducted at Yokohama, Osaga, Kyoto, Shanghai, Hong-Kong, Canton, Amoy, and Foo Chow. At Tokio several buildings of the Imperial Japanese University were torn down and burned, because some of the rats in the building were found to be infected with plague bacilli. Although the plague has not yet invaded Tokio the authorities have determined not to relax their precautions. With this object they are commencing a new crusade against rats, this time by a system of rewards. Instead of paying so much per rat, prizes will be allotted after the total number reaches 200,000.
