Artemesia council met on August 6th, members all present, the reeve in the chair. The minutes of session of July 6; ult. were read and confirmed. Estimates from the following school sections were presented.

Thompson—Muir—That the following bills for gravel supplied overseers be paid, the same having been duly certified to by overseers.

Gibson—Muir—That John McGee be paid \$2.00 for repairing bridge on con 10, as certified to by Robert Holley.

Muir—Gibson—That W. H. Thurston be paid \$5.00 on account of printing contract.

Thompson—Boyd—That Henry Fenwick be paid \$6.25 for clearing out culvert on So sideroad, concession 8, as certified by committee of this council.

Boyd—Muir—That Messrs. Lucas, Wright and McArdle be paid \$17.50, amount of their bill for legal services and other legal services—Carried.

Muir—Gibson—That W. J. Davis account of \$1.10 for bolts and axle greases for road grader be paid.—Carried.

Thompson—Boyd—That in accordance with the report of Mr. Muir in the matter, \$15.00 is hereby granted to be expended with a view of taking the water off the road allowance on south line at lots 27 and 28.

Thompson—Muir—That Thomas Manders' name be erased from the list of indigents of the township.—Carried.

Boyd—Gibson—That this council insis upon John I. Graham giving a deed of all lands included in the award of the arbitrators in the matter of a road deviation over N. part of lots 22 and 23, con. 13 of the township.—Carried.

Muir—Gibson—That the report of the reeves of Proton and Artemesia regarding the opening of part of the townline as lots 1 to 5, con. 1 S. D. B. be adopted as any amount of money that could be expended this year would not be of any particular benefit to the public.—Carried.
