Trade in cattle to-day was brisk, as the supply was not so large as has been the rule lately. Prices beld steady to firm, but quotably unchanged. Stock was well taken. Sheep were easier and lambs lower. Hogs were nuchanged. Other lines were steady. The run was light in cattle and heavy in sheep and hogs-56 loads, 659 cattle, 1,650 sheep and lambs, 25 calves and 1,800 hogs, Good veal calves were wanted.

Export Cattle-Steady demand, and prices ran from \$4.75 to \$5,121 for best stock, and medium grades including light
