Hail! d : r t : d These words set to music may be all right, but applied as they have been here on Thursday, they lose all their musical rhythm, if none of their force when they come in the shape of chunks of ice, the size of hen fruit, instead of a form of salvation. A storm of more than usual electrical energy passed over here, doing considerable damage to the ground in some instances, and stripping the leaves of corn stalks, turkeys and potatoes while not a house but what has suffered in the shape of broken panes of glass, in some instances not a pane being left in windows facing the storm which came from the north-east. The noise of the falling hail mingled with thunder was something terrible. The fences and buildings yet show the dents of the falling missiles. Fruit has been badly bruised and knocked off the trees in large quantities, while some of the chickens of our noted poultry raiser, not being up to dodging, suffered the death penalty. What crop remaining out is badly thrashed in some places, and will have to be cut with a mower.

The men were capt by Messrs John Weir and Dan McKinnon, the latter winning by a slight margin through some tight mortises on the other side I suppose. Mr. John Wilson of Drumore ably superintended everything and gave the word of command. An event like this is a rare occurrence in a neighborhood of good barns, consequently the youth and beauty for miles around gathered as if to a picnic. Many were the enquiries about the youth from Maxwell, who seems to occupy quite a space in the affections of the young ladies. ### A Violent Hailstorm.

Thursday evening last a district of little more than a mile wide near the townline of Egremont and Guelph was devastated by a hail storm of great severity. It began to rain at 4 p. m. and continued for 10 or 15 minutes and slightly cleared up before beginning again a mixture of rain and hail, the latter of such a size as to cause dire havoc. Mr. W. L. Dixon, one of our informants, says that some of the hail was 2 inches in diameter. He had about 20 panes of glass broken, and some of his neighbors fared as badly. Fields of mcut out, looked as if they had been reaped. Showers of green leaves were stripped from the trees, fruit knocked down and corn fields left in a dishevelled state. Six hours afterwards on the north side of a barn the stones could be lifted in shovelfuls. To be exposed to the storm was really unsafe and from another credible source we learned that chickens actually had their heads cut off! It certainly was one of the worst storms this district ever experienced, and the loss to many farmers will be considerable: \$50 in some cases will scarcely meet the damage. ### Live Stock Market Toronto.

Trade in cattle to-day was brisk, as the supply was not so large as has been the rule lately. Prices held steady to firm, but gradually unchanged. Stock was well taken. Sheep were easier and lambs lower. Hogs were unchanged. Other lots were steady. The run was light in cattle and heavy in sheep and hogs—56 loads, 650 cattle, 1,650 sheep and lambs, 25 calves and 1,800 hogs. Good veal calves were wanted. Export Cattle—Steady demand, and prices ran from \$4.75 to \$5.12 for best stock, and medium grades including light weights, were sold at \$4.25 to 4.60. Butchers' Cattle—Smaller offerings met a brisker demand at unchanged prices. The best lots were firm at \$4.40 to \$4.75 and choice were steady at \$4 to \$4.50. Other grades were unchanged at \$2.75 to \$3.75. Feeders and Stockers—Few offered to a rather weak demand. Prices ranged from \$2.25 to \$3.25 for stockers and \$3.25 to \$4.50 for light to short feeders. Milch Cows—Prices were steady at \$30 to \$45. Not many wanted. Sheep and Lambs—Prices for lambs were again 25c lower at \$1 to \$4.50 per cwt. Export sheep were easier at \$3.40 to \$3.60 per cwt. Hogs—Steady and unchanged at \$7.25 per cwt for light and fat.
