A GOOD SETTLEMENT.

Cedarville Presbyterians Made Happy.

On Tuesday the commission to Cedarville congregation had a heavy docket of business on hand which kept them busy for nearly five hours, but they had the satisfaction of finally reaching a conclusion which was agreed to without a dissenting voice. The matter between the sections of the congregation was settled by the congregation agreeing to bear the costs of both sections, the seal to the agreement being given by Mr. Rogers, ex-treasurer, landing over to the Presbyterian commission the balance held by him since last January. The dispute with the Pease Furnace Co. was left to Rev's. McCullough and Farquharson to settle if possible by a conference with the treasurer of the Pease Company. Failing an amicable settlement these gentlemen are appointed to act as arbitrators for the congregation. Each party is to bear their own legal costs, the furnace Company guaranteeing to make the furnace satisfactory to the arbitrators before payment is asked. The settlement is thus made on the lines of an offer made by the Pease Furnace Company to the Presbyterian Commission. The congregation has learned that the ways of the law are dear, for they will have practically two furnaces to pay for instead of one, yet all day there was not a hard word said, and all parties went away in a happier mood than the commission has seen them on any previous occasion. There is evidently a substantial and enterprising body of people in Cedarville congregation and it is hoped that they have started on a new era of prosperity.
