

Butchers' Catile-Offerings were mostly of common grades, selling at \$3 to \$3 50 per cwt, and some mixed butchers' selling at \$3,85.

Feeders-The Manitoba shipments wate mostly feeders and they sold low. Stags and bulls brought \$2.90 per cwt, and steers sold from 3.40 to \$3.75 per cwt. according to weight. Prices were probaally depressed somewhat by the report of anthrax among Northwest cattle.

Stockers-Were steady and prices unchanged at \$3,75 to \$4 per cwt for heavy animals and \$2 to \$3.25 for off-colors and Milch Cows-Good milchers were want-

ed. Sales ranged around \$35. Sheep-Were stoady and sold well at \$3 to \$3.25 for export ewes. At this figure all were sold.

Lambs-Were steady at \$3.50 to \$3.75 Hogs - Were firm and unchanged. Receipts were heavy.
