New York, Oct. 4 .- Herr Kress, inventor of an airship, started on Thursday afternoon on another trial flight on the Tulinbacher reservoir, says the Vienna correspondent of the Herald. The Boers then rushed the camp, but not a single man surrendered; the enemy levelled their rifles and fired on any man they saw. Upon Major Nickalls' equadron coming up they retired quickly in the direction in

which they had come. The Boers on entering the camp went straight for the supplies, but were able to take away only a few biscuits and hardly any ammunition. the Lancers having emptied their bandoliers, as the hundreds of empty quently testified.
