**THE LATE JOHN McFARLANE.**

A week ago to-day, Thursday, the above gentleman was on the street in his usual health, to-morrow he will be laid in the silent tomb, so suddenly does the death call come. A slight cold aggravated the asthmatic affection he has had for years, and after a few days' illness he died on Tuesday about noon. Mr. McFarlane was born in Iona, Scotland, nearly 70 years ago, and came to this country a young man of 21, settling first in Vaughan and then moving to the "hush" in Glenelg, near Wauchoy P. O., over 40 years ago, and thus had a share in the pioneer work of the early days. He is survived by his widow to whom he was married over 40 years ago, 3 sons and 5 daughters. The sons are: Neil, Hamilton; Dan, Midland; and John, at home. The daughters are Mrs. Beady and Mrs. Hall Toronto, Mrs. Bailey, Chicago, Mrs. Boyd, and Misses Minnie and Kate, to all of whom we extend sympathy. The deceased was a man of sterling character and greatly valued as neighbor and friend as well as in the more endearing family ties. His funeral takes place to-morrow at 2:30.

**THE LATE HON. CLARKE WALLACE.**

Last Saturday, amid full Orange ceremony, all that was mortal of the late Grand Sovereign of the Orange Order was laid to rest. His death has called forth many tokens of respect from friends and political foes for of personal foes he seems to have had few or none. In the quarrels and struggles of his party prior to their defeat in 1896, his course showed in marked favorable contrast to most of his colleagues. Differing from them on their attitude on the Manitoba School question, he resigned his position and port folio thus sacrificing for principle a salary of \$5000 a year. He met with bitter opposition even inside the Orange order, but he outlived it all and died "on top" both in the Society and in his political position. We append the following brief sketch from "Saturday Night". The death of Mr. N. Clarke Wallace, M. P., robs the Conservative party of its ablest, most honest and most diligent supporter in the Province of Ontario, if not in the whole Dominion. I speak advisedly in making this statement, for while he may not have possessed greater ability than any other nor greater honesty, he was more diligent than any of his colleagues, and certainly possessed the three qualities named to a greater extent than any other one man in the Conservative ranks. He was intensely fond of his family; did more for his native village than any other man; was always ready to speak and work for a political friend, no matter what weather or expense had to be met; true to his principles, faithful to his country and loyal to his King. As Controller of Customs he was popular with political friends and opponents alike, untiring in the discharge of his duties, and was never suspected of the smallest peccadillo for the benefit of either himself, his friends or his party. He was the type of man who is needed in every country and in every parliament, and he will be sorely missed by the Orange order, of which he was the head for fourteen years. Though he was a hard fighter there are none who will remember him with unkindness, while there are thousands who enjoyed his personal friendship who will mourn his death as that of a brother.
