A QUEBEC VIEW

Of The Ontario Government.

A recent issue of the Montreal Daily Herald contained the following able article on the Ontario government, and as too few of our Ontario people ever see this able journal we select their oopinion of the two parties in this province as likely to be more unbiassed than what is found at home. Stockers sell fairly well at steady prices, and exhibit no -pecial feature one way or the other.
