At the Asylums for the insane in Toronto, London, Kingston, Hamilton, Mimico, Brockville, Cobourg and Orillia; the Central Prison and Mercer Reformatory, Toronto; the Reformatory for Boys, Penetanguishene; the Institutions for Deaf and Dumb, Belleville, and the Blind at Brantford.

Exception—Tenders are not required for the supply of meat to the asylums in Toronto, London, Kingston, Hamilton and Brockville, nor for the Central Prison and Mercer Reformatory, Toronto.

A marked cheque for five per cent. of the estimated amount of the contract, payable to the order of the Honorable the Provincial Secretary, must be furnished by each tenderer as a guarantee of his bona fides. Two sufficient sureties will be required for due fulfillment of each contract, and should any tender be withdrawn before the contract is awarded, or should the tenderer fail to furnish such security, the amount of the deposit will be forfeited.

The Municipal council of the township of Artemesia met in Flahberton on Saturday, November 2, 1901. Members all present, Reeve in the chair. Minutes of meeting of Oct. 4, read and confirmed. Following communications were presented and read: R. McDowell, C. E. plan and description of deviation of road through lots 23 and 24, concession 9; report of Mr. Boyd of expenditure in division 3. Accounts: T. A. Gilchrist for repairs to grader, \$2.15; C. Stewart for gravel, \$3.00; Thos. Clark, gravel, \$4.50; Sawyer, Massey and Co., new blade for grader and express charges, \$9.30; R. McDowell, surveying, plan and description for roads, \$65. By-law No. 600, to appoint deputy returning officers and fixing polling places, was introduced and read a first time.

Thompson—Boyd—That by-law 600 be now read a second time.—Carried.

Boyd—Gibson—That the council go into committee on by-law 600.—Carried.

Council went into committee on by-law 600. Mr. Boyd in the chair.

Mr. Boyd presented the by-law No. 600 as filed up in committee, appointing the following deputy returning officers for 1902, viz.: Div. 1, H. D. McLaughery; Div. 2, W. J. Bellamy; Div. 3, T. M. Bamon; Div. 4, Donald McLeod; Div. 5, Neil McKinnon; Div. 6, Geo. Waring; Div. 7, James Williams; Div. 8, H. R. Dyson; and fixing the following places for holding elections; Div. 1, schoolhouse S. S. No. 2; Div. 2, Town hall, Fisherton; Div. 3, Orange hall, Proton Station; Div. 4, Orange hall, Ceylon; Div. 5, Watsons Hall, Priceville; Div. 6, Forrester's hall, Vandeleur; Div. 7, Orange hall Eugenia; Div. 8, Schoolhouse, S. S. No. 8; and that not more than two dollars be paid for any hall or schoolhouse for such election.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That By-law No. 600, be read a third time at the session to be held Dec. 16, 1901.—Carried.

Boyd—Gibson—That the Sawyer, Massey Co. be paid \$8.50 for blade and 70c. express charges on same.—Carried.

Gibson—Muir—That the following accounts for gravel be paid, viz: Chas. Stewart 60 yds. at 5c. 30; Thomas Clark, 86 yds at 5c., \$4.30; Thomas Granger, 22 yds at 5c., \$1.10.—Carried.

Muir—Boyd—That T. A. Gilchrist account for repairs to road grader, \$2.15, be paid.—Carried.

Muir—Gibson—That Commissioner No. 3, be paid \$20.80, commission on expenditure of \$260 at 8 per cent; also \$7.50 for 5 days overseeing work with grader.—Carried.

Thompson—Gibson—That R. McDowell, C. E. be paid \$35 for services surveying and making plans and surveys at the request of this council.—Carried.

McTavish—Gibson—That John Fisher and Edgar Johnston be paid fifty cents each for assistance in surveying road over lot 24, con. 9.—Carried.

Muir—Thompson—That the clerk be paid \$4 for two days assisting engineer in surveys.—Carried.

Thompson—Boyd—That the reeve is hereby instructed to issue checks to the several school trustees boards of the township for payment of the general school rates for 1901, the same to be paid when money is available.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to meet on the 16th day of December, pursuant to statute.—Advance.

AN HONORED NATIVE OF ULVA.

The following obituary notice appeared in a New Zealand paper "The Bruce Herald" a few months ago. The subject of the notice was a brother of Mrs. Neil McDougall, Crawford, and had many friends and acquaintances in Bentinck and Glenelg.

"It is with feelings of extreme regret that we chronicle the death of another of Tokomairiro's pioneer settlers, in the person of Mr. Donald MacDonald, of Milburn, whose demise occurred shortly after nine o'clock yesterday morning. Deceased had reached the ripe old age of 73 years. For some years he suffered from heart disease, but it was only lately that his complaint took a very serious turn, and he was obliged to remain indoors. On Sunday evening Mr. MacDonald complained of feeling rather worse than usual, but towards morning recovered so much that he arose and partook of a hearty breakfast. Later he spoke reassuringly of the change for the better, and was walking in the direction of the kitchen when, without warning, he was observed to fall down and expired immediately. Dr. Stewart, who was attending deceased, was afterwards called in, but pronounced life extinct. Mr. MacDonald was a native of Soribay, Isle of Ulva, and came to New Zealand in 1833. He has resided on his farm at Milburn for upwards of 30 years, and during that time he has always been one of the foremost settlers in any step that was taken for the advancement of the district. The deceased was ever known for his upright and honest character, and his many deeds of kindness to his neighbors will long live in the memory of those with whom he was acquainted. He also took a keen interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the Presbyterian Church in this district, and for many years has been associated with the Milton congregation as one of the elders, who worked so hard to have the magnificent church erected which now stands in our midst. The deceased also took an active part in the proposal to have a church established at Milburn, and latterly had the satisfaction of witnessing the erection and opening of it. Mr. MacDonald was an active member of Court Bruce, A. O. F."
