The National Portland Cement Company is organized with \$1,000,000 capital. Its directors are Messrs A. F. MacLaren, M. P. Stratford; W. F. Cowham, Jackson, Mich; Barlow Cumberland, Toronto; P. W. Stanhope, Toronto, and Gilbert McKechnie, ex-M. P. P., Durham.
