THE LIQUOR LAW DECISION.

As reported, the finding of the Priyy Council on the Manitoba prohibition law is as oracular as the circumstances would permit, if not more so. It declares that the legislature has power to pass a liquor law. The decision is absolutely meaningless unless it refers to the act which the court had before it which happens to be entitled 'the Liquor Act.' It must be confessed that the Privy Council has, in dealing with Canadian constitutional questions, shown a rare ingenuity in answering as little and as indecisively as possible; but we cannot think that when the validity of a given act was submitted to that court it could consider the question judged by 1 00 merely declaring that the legislature had power of pass a liquor law, or even 4.00 a law prohibiting the sale of liquor. 1.00 The act which was actually before them leaves probibitionists little to wish for. 1 25 and if it is valid all other provincial 1 15 laws will be. The entire sale of liquor 1 00 for beverage purposes is prohibited. There are only two classes of licenses provided for, a druggist's wholesale license and a druggist's retail license. Only druggists duly quanfied and licensed as such, can dispense alcohol, and only on a doctor's prescription for each and every sale. Liquor cannot even be given in any place whatsoever other 25c. only to ministers. Record of every sale Farmers' Institute will likely go in must be kept open to all. The penalties practically prohibitive. We await de tails with much interest. Unless we are entirely mistaken the general principle that provinces can prohibit the sale of lipuor is clearly maintained. Such a finding constitutes an era in the constitutional history of the question, and is great news for four or five provinces any way. We await particulars with the greatest interest as the Premier of Ontario, himself a prohibitionist, has declared that if the act is maintained a bill as effective will be passed in Ontario. If he stands boldly and unequivocally by this promise the province will stand by him. - Witness.

Live Stock Market Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 22 .- At the Western cattle yards to-day we received 68 loads of live stock, including 800 cattle, 1,760 sheep and lambs, 1.150 hogs, and a light run of calves and milch cows.

Butcher cattle and hogs were unchanged and steady; in other respects the market was badly off color.

There was scarcely any export trade; there was next to no demand and the receipts were of poor quality. Prices ranged from 4 to 43c per pound

A few lots of fairly good butcher cattle sold at from 4 to 41 per pound, but the trade was weak for all poorer grades Stockers and feeders were in moderate demand at unchanged prices.

Small stuff was if possible worse to-day than yesterday, and it required good ewes or choice lambs to fetch 3c per pound. The mannet was in all respects one of no importance.

Hogs are unchanged and fairly steady. The best price for "singers" is 51c per pound; thick fat and light hogs are worth 51c per pound.
