The revee reported rep bridge, lot 6, con 5, by D Ferguson 50c; filling approaches to culvert, lot 13, con 8, by L Hatlie \$5; clearing roadway lot 27-28, con 9-10 by J Robinson \$20; removing stump by Jas Plant 25c, payment recommended.

Walls—McFadden—That Com McQueen's report be adopted and orders granted and Com receive \$2 fees. Carried.

McFadden—Hobb—That A McCabe's acc't of \$2.90 for crossing be not entered, but his acc't of \$2 for rep grader, as well as Geo Dale's acc't of \$1.50 rep grader be paid—Mr Forest refunded half cost of repairing grader. Carried.

Robb—Walls—That Wm Kingston be paid \$10 re appeal school case at Conn. Carried.

Com Robb reported filling approach to bridge lot 16 con 14 and rep culvert, 5th sideroad by W Reid cost \$5; a tile culvert 10th sideroad by Jas Hamilton \$1.50; clearing and rep culvert 10th sideroad by S Newton, cost 75 cts.

McIntyre—McFadden—That foregoing report be adopted and orders granted and that Com receive \$2 fees. Carried.

McIntyre—McFadden—That Com Robb's report for drawing tile be adopted and his acc't of \$1.50 be paid. Carried.

The revee reported examining the roadway across Wilder's Lake and from the information received—that said roadway belongs to this municipality.

Walls—McFadden—That the revee's report be adopted and he be paid \$5 expenses to Toronto in connection with said roadway. Carried.

By-law 145 for holding municipal Elections passed the usual readings, was signed sealed, &c.

McFadden—Hobb—That the request from Dromore and Holstein re a Public Library grant be laid over until next meeting of council. Carried.

Walls—Robb—That R T Dodds be credited with 2 days roadwork for 1902. Carried.

Walls—McIntyre—That the Financial Statement as presented by the revee and Treasurer be received and adopted. Car.

Robb—McFadden—That the revee be paid \$2 for preparing Fin. Statement. Car.

McIntyre—McFadden—That 200 copies of Financial Statement be printed at the Review Office Durham for distribution on nomination day. Carried.

Resolved that the following accounts be paid:—John Rice, gravel \$4; J Hincks, gravel \$3.53; F Jordan, gravel \$1.33; Wm. World Election supplies \$8.20; A Mitchell, express charges 40 cts; Clerk, \$1.10; G Freeman, four Mrs Barelay \$9.60; clerk's quarter salary \$33; Clerk, postage and stationery \$3.

By-Law No 415.

Of the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Durham. A By-Law to authorize the issue of Debentures of the town of Durham in the County of Grey, to the amount of \$2500.00 for the purpose of building a bridge across the Saugeen River at Lambton Street in the Town of Durham.

WHEREAS it is advisable and requisite that a bridge shall be built on Lambton Street at the point of intersection of the said Street with the Saugeen River in the said Town of Durham.

AND WHEREAS in order thereto it will be necessary to issue Debentures of the said Town of Durham for the sum of \$2500.00 as herein after provided, (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-law) the proceeds of the said Debentures to be applied to the said purpose and to no other.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said Debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of twenty years being the currency of the said Debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in the other nineteen years of said period, (as shown in Schedule "A" hereto annexed.)

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest hereon after provided for is \$188.95.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Town of Durham, according to the last revised assessment roll thereof is \$841,016.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing Debenture debt of the said Municipality is \$88,498.13 whereof no part of the principal or interest is in arrear.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Durham Enacts as follows:

1. The sum of \$2500.00 shall be expended by the Town of Durham in building a bridge across the Saugeen River where the said River intersects Lambton Street in the Town of Durham and for the purpose of raising the said sum, Debentures of the said Town of Durham to the said amount in the whole shall be issued in sums of not less than \$100.00 each on the 1st day of May A. D., 1902, each of which Debentures shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof and shall be payable within Twenty years thereafter, namely: one of each of the said Debentures on the 1st day of the month of May in each year after the passing of this By-law at the Standard Bank of Canada in the said Town of Durham.

2. Each of the said Debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the said Town of Durham, and by the Treasurer thereof of the said Town of Durham, and the Clerk shall attach thereto the Corporate Seal of the Municipality.

3. The said Debentures shall bear interest at the rate of Four per cent per annum payable yearly at the said Bank on the 1st day of May in each and every year during the currency thereof and shall have coupons attached to them for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the said Town of Durham.

4. During the currency of the said Debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said Town of Durham, the sum of \$188.95 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt, (as shown in the Schedule "A" hereto annexed.)

5. This By-law shall take effect on the 6th day of January A. D. 1902.

6. The votes of the Electors of the said Town of Durham shall be taken on this By-law at the following times and places, that is to say, on Monday the 6th day of January A. D. 1902, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, by the following deputy returning officers:

North Ward at Norman Kelsey's House Clifton Elvidge, Dep. Ret. Officer. East Ward at the Town Hall, W. B. Vollett, Dep. Ret. Officer. West Ward at Pasco Saunders' shop, John Smith Dep. Ret. Officer.

7. On Saturday the 4th day of January, A. D. 1902 the Mayor of the said town of Durham shall attend at Ten o'clock in the forenoon at the Council Chamber to appoint persons to attend at the various polling places aforesaid and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this By-law respectively.

8. The Clerk of the said Town of Durham shall attend at the said Council Chamber at 12 o'clock in the forenoon of Tuesday the 7th day of January, A. D. 1902 to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.
