Monday last was a fine day for the
choosing of Municipal rulers, and
heavy votes were polled.

DURHAM
Interest here centered almost wholly
in the mayoralty contest between Wm.
Calder and Norman McIntyre, and the
latter by a majority of 7 secures the
position. The result was in doubt al-
most to the last moment. The north
ward giving Calder 15 where the Mc
Intyre men counted on 9 the other way
gave a chill to the party of the new
mayor, but the chill was the other way
when the east ward gave Mr. McIntyre
20. During the long wait for the big
West Ward, enthusiasm grew, and
when at last it was found that Mr. Mc
Intyre had a majority of 2 in his own
ward, giving him 7 in the town, cheers
and other demonstrations greeted the
hero of the hour. From the balcony
of his residence short speeches were
made by Mr. McIntyre, Mr. Laidlaw,
Mr. McKinnon, and later the band
serenaded some of the victors of the
day. The council contest gave some
surprises and good men have fallen.
The result is given below and it will
be freely admitted that we have in the
council for 1902 the material for good
work. Mr. A. S. Hunter is the only
member of the old council at the board,
he being the only one offering. As was
expected Mr. John McKechnie headed
the poll with Mr. J. H. Brown a good
second.

The interest in the trustee contests
were overshadowed by the others. Re-
grets are expressed at the loss of Mr.
Wolfe's services to the board, though
his successor will worthily take up his
work.

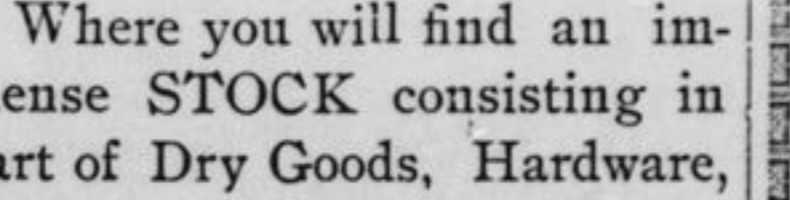
