**KILLED BY A FALL.**—The Hon. Richard Reid Dobell, Canadian Minister without portfolio, was thrown from his horse, near Foreston, England, on Saturday last and is dead, never having recovered consciousness. His Ottawa colleagues were of course shocked, and Sir Wilfred cabled condolences to his widow. The Globe says him this tribute: "The news of the sudden death of the Hon. R. R. Dobell, cabled from England on Saturday, will be received with general sorrow. Mr. Dobell was a very prominent business man of Quebec, and one of its most public-spirited citizens. He took a deep interest in the extension of trade relations between Canada and Great Britain, and was a strong advocate of a fast Atlantic service. In the Dominion Cabinet he held a position without portfolio, but his business knowledge and his energy made his advice and co-operation very valuable. Mr. Dobell was one of the early advocates of Imperial federation, and assisted Lord Rosebery in forming the British Empire League."
