PROVINCIAL AUCTION SALES
OF
PURE BRED LIVE STOCK.

The following letter will explain it-
self and the matter of it should be of first
interest to cattleman.

Editor Review.

My dear Sir,—
Enclosed please find
Second Annual Announcement of the
Ontario Provincial Auction Sales of
Pure Bred Live Stock, which will be
held in the city of Ottawa, February
12th, and in the city of Guelph, Feb-
ruary 26th. At each of these sales a
number of first class animals will be
offered. A considerable number have
already been entered but none will
be catalogued until each has been
inspected, for each must be of good
quality. The breeding also must be
beyond question, and for this reason it
will pay farmers, Agricultural Associa-
tions, and Farmers Clubs to buy their
breeding stock at these annual sales.
Western ranchers and stock growers
will be well repaid if they attend at
Ottawa and Guelph. I respectfully
request you to read the rules and
conditions governing each sale. At
Guelph, sixty Shorthorn bulls will be
offered, and about twenty females.
A few very good Herefords, Polled
Angus and Galloways will also be
sold. Yorkshires, Tamworths, and
Berkshires will be the only breeds of
pigs offered this year. Altogether the
quality and condition of the animals
sold at Ottawa and Guelph will be
better than last year. Every precau-
tion will be taken to safeguard the
interests of both the buyers and sellers.
In case a buyer, coming from a distant
Province wishes to buy a carload or
more and does not get all he wants to
either of the sales, arrangements have
been completed whereby the officers
of the Provincial Associations are able
to assist him in procuring what he may
want, with little or no additional ex-
pense to himself, other than the price
of the animals. You are cordially in-
vited to attend. I shall be pleased to
meet you and render you any assis-
tance that I am able. Catalogues of
the stock may be obtained from Mr. A.
P. Westervelt, Parliament Buildings,
Toronto. Persons not able to attend
may, with perfect safety, forward
orders to Mr. Westervelt.

Interprovincial Trade in Live Stock.

Trade in live stock between Eastern
and Western Canada has been grow-
ing rapidly within the last few years.
This increase of trade has been promoted
and in fact made possible, by the wise
and generous treatment of the C. P. R.
During the month of December and the
first eight days in January, forty-six
cars of grade and pure-bred cattle
were shipped from Eastern Canada to
British Columbia. These cars contain-
ed 2,223 head, and cost in the East
something over \$30,000.00. Besides
these, a considerable number have
recently been sent to the North West
Territories, and orders are now in
hand for additional shipments to be
made to the last mentioned Territory.
In order to promote this trade, which
has proved very profitable in many
districts in Eastern Canada, farmers
should use first class Shorthorn bulls.
By careful selection and wise treatment
females sired by such bulls will prove
excellent dairy cows.

It is a noticeable fact that seven-
tenths of the stock used for dairy
purposes in Great Britain are Shorthorns
and Shorthorn grades. Probably the
most suitable dairy cow for the aver-
age farmer is a Shorthorn-Ayrshire
cross. Steers whose dams are strong
grade Ayrshire cows if got by a Short-
horn bull prove excellent feeders and
very desirable shipping cattle. As
dairy animals there are none, in the
hands of the general farmer, that will
excel the Shorthorn-Ayrshire cross.

POLITICAL.

Last Wednesday there were nine con-
tests for vacancies in the Dominion
house and the Liberals won six of them.
Interest all over the Dominion centred
in W. York where Arch Campbell was
pitted against a brother of the late
Hon. N. Clarke Wallace. At the last
election Campbell was defeated by a
majority of 820, but on this occasion
has wiped out this and has 153 to the
good. The victory is all the more no-
table seeing the riding has been Con-
servative for 20 years. Campbell is ex-
ceedingly popular. has large business
interests in the riding, and in ability
ranks high.

The other contests were St. James
Div., Montreal, Brunet, Liberal, by 700;
Kingston, Hon. Wm. Hart, Liberal by
723; West Hastings, E. Gus Porter,
Conservative, 496; West Durham,
Beith, Liberal, 21; West Queens, P. E.
I., Hon. Donald Farquharson, Liberal,
437; L'Islet, Quebec, Carboneau, Lib-
eral, by 1; (Caron demands a recount
Addington, Avery, Conservative, 400.
This result shows the usual experi-
ence of bye-elections going with the
government which majority is thus
increased and the average of ability
certainly not lessened.



THE LATE MRS. DARROCH.

The Collingwood Bulletin of recent
date has the following obituary of an
early pioneer who has still numerous
relatives in S. Grey:—

A sense of grief and loss prevailed the
entire community on Monday morning
when it became known that Mrs. Dar-
roch, widow of the late Duncan Dar-
roch, had passed into rest on the pre-
ceding evening. For many months she
had been in delicate health, and the
end had for some time been drawing
visibly nearer. When it came it found
her ready. With implicit trust in her
Savior she was able fearlessly, to look
death in the face, and passed quietly
away surrounded by members of her
family, to whom she several times
sweetly said, "I am going Home."
Mrs. Darroch was born in Bridgen, Islay
Scotland. She was married in Port
Glasgow, a small village on the Clyde
in 1851. They remained for some time
in Durham, and came to Collingwood
in the first year of their residence in the
New World. Here they lived happily
together, bearing the sorrows and joys
of life together until Xmas morning
1892, when her husband was called
away and left her to finish her journey
alone. Their family consisted of five
sons and five daughters. Of the daugh-
ters, two preceded their parents to the
land beyond, one, Mrs. Lecour resides
in Toronto, while Elizabeth and Laura
still remain at home. Of the boys, two
also are dead, Archie and Duncan;
George lives in the city; John is a promi-
nent merchant, one of the principals of
the firm of Weber & Darroch, Dougald
is a most highly esteemed traveller with

the wholesale manufacturing house of
Telfer Bros. Tho for several years,
Mrs. Darroch had not taken a public
part in any church or charitable work,
yet in the early days of her life in Col-
lingwood she was a most active worker,
she was at the time of her death the
oldest Presbyterian in Collingwood, and
collected money for the furnishing of
the first Presbyterian church in town,
a building which Mr. Darroch, helped to
erect. Indeed, of the earlier citizens
there, are only three others, Dr. Steph-
en, Charles MacDonnell and T. Long,
who lived here in 1854 still remain. The
funeral took place on Wednesday after-
noon to the Presbyterian cemetery and
was largely attended. The ceremony
was conducted by the Rev. J. A. Cran-
stone, B. A., pastor of the church. The
family to whom she was devotedly at-
tached and who tenderly loved her in
return, have the sympathy of a wide
circle of friends in their bereavement.
