PUBLIG LIBRARY.

The adjourned Annual Meeting of this body was held on Friday evening last. The attendance was not large, the bulk of its 108 members seeming to be satisfied to allow its interests to lie wholly with the managing board.

The election of officers took place, and these are as follows:

President-Thos. Allan. Vice Pres.-T. Moran. Treas. - Jno. Kelly, Secretary-Chas, Ramage.

Directors:-N. W. Campbell, C Mc-Arthur, Jno. A. Graham, Wm. Irwin. Wm. Wells, Jos. Burnet, A. W. Hunter. R. J. S. Dewar, J. L. Browne, and resident clergyman.

The question of moving the Reading Room to a location easier reached by the class intended to be benefitted, was introduced and discussed; also the propriety of asking the council for a grant. A committee consisting of President, Secretary, Campbell, Irwin. and resident clergyman were appointed to wait on the council.

The death of the late President Dr. Gun was brought before the meeting. The resolution passed by the directors at their meeting on Nov. 15th, last was read and its sentiments and purpose endorsed by the Annual meeting. The address is given below.

Resolution of Condolence and appreciation on the late Dr. Gun, for many years President and moving spirit of Durham Public Library, Passed by Board of Directors, Nov. 15, 1901 and endorsed by Annual Meeting Jan. 24.

"Moved by C. Ramage, seconded by C Mc Arthur, that the Board of Durham Public Library at this the first meeting since the death of the late President, Dr. Gun, take the opportunity of recording their sense of the loss sustained by his removal. One of the most active of its promoters at its institution 28 years ago, he showed ever since a singular fidelity to all its interests. He was secretary for the first 12 years of its life and President for the last 15 years, and he made of these positions no ornamental sinecure. A proof of his devotion is shown in the fact, that during his presidency he was absent only four times at recorded meetings. But his mere attendance is no measure of his work. His sole and unselfish aim was to advance the moral and intellectual life of the community, and whether in selecting books and magazines, planning for lectures, evening classes &c.,

he ever had before him the importance of guiding aright the intellectual steps of the young, and for this purpose much of his time and thought were gladly given. The extent of this library and the success it has attained are in no small measure due to the 28 years of faithful service given to it by Dr. Gun. While we deplore his loss we know it is small in comparison with that of

A NEW EDUCATIONAL MOVE.

Sir Wm. McDonald, the wealthy Montreal millionaire is planning generous things with part of his great wealth. No less than the improvement of education in the rural schools of Ontario. We are accustomed to hear so often of our excellent school system that the announcement surprises us, but his idea it seems is to introduce technical education that will have a bearing in the practical life the bulk of the pupils will lead. A despatch says: Prof. Robertson has forwarded to the Government the details of the scheme of Sir Wm. McDonald for the improvement of education in the rural schools of Ontario, toward which Sir William is prepared to give generous aid. The intention is to consolidate five or six rural schools at convenient points, changing them into one graded school, with a school garden and a manual training room as part of the equipment, One experiment will be conducted at Sir William's expense in each of the provinces, and a thorough test given to

Garden and nature studies will be Garden and nature studies will be promoted by means of, a travelling instructor, who will give lessons to the teachers in rural schools. Among the subjects will be dairying, poultry keeping, hee keeping, fruit growing, general gardening, and for girls, preparation and serving of foods, dressmaking and simple forms of household art and decoration, and the care and cleaning of rooms. In brief, Sir William, would introduce technical education for farm life into the rural schools.
