### COUNTY COUNCIL.

Continued from last week.

application from Prisoner's Aid Association, Toronto, for a grant; application from the Poultry Association for a \$50 grant; application of Douglas J. McDonald to be appointed county student to the Ontario Agricultural College; account for building Hudson's bridge, \$821.17; a number of accounts for inspecting bridges were presented and referred to the Road and Bridge committee.

Reports were presented from Finance committee, County Property committee and report of special committee on the House of Refuge. The finance committee's report and the County Property committee's report were adopted by the council. The remainder of Wednesday afternoon was spent in discussing the report of the committee on the House of Refuge, the council, judging from the speeches, being pretty equally divided. The committee rose at 6.30 asking leave to sit again, after which council adjourned till Thursday.

THURSDAY MORNING. Council met at ten o'clock, and after the calling of the roll, council went into committee of the whole to equalize the county assessment. Mr. Pringle in the chair. The council spent most of Thursday in threshing out the several assessments. Owen Sound was raised \$250.00 and Derby \$50.00. Durham, Markdale, Hanover and several other municipalities were also raised.

The House of Refuge question also came up again when it was decided to continue the committee, which was instructed to get further information and a sketch of building, with cost of site, etc., and report at June meeting. Council adjourned till Friday.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON. Reports were made by the following committees: Finance, Roads and Bridges, Education, Printing, Communication and Memorials, and also by the committee re good roads, of which Mr. McDonald is chairman. The reports were all adopted without amendment.

Messrs Preston, Harness, Schenk and McArthur were appointed a committee to report on the treasurer's surties. By-laws were put through appointing Rev. Jas Ardill, collegiate Institute Trustee; Frank Abbott, Meaford High School Trustee; and C. A. Fleming and R. H. Fortune, county auditors for 1902. A by-law to erect Clarksburg into a police village was also passed.

SATURDAY MORNING. It was expected that an hour would finish the business on Saturday, but discussion cropped up on a couple of subjects which kept the members until twenty minutes after 12.

Clerk Rutherford reported with reference to gaol supplies, the committee recommending that the tender of D R Duncan for groceries, D B McGill for bread, C. W. Gray for meat, and Geo A Sargeant for milk be accepted, being lowest in each case. The report was adopted.

Report of County property recommended that the walls and corridors of the court house be suitably cleaned; that unless the burglar alarm be rendered inoperative lighting be adopted; that the old fence in front of the court house be removed and a new one built and the grounds fixed; also that several accounts, etc., be passed. This report read by Mr. Pringle, chairman, was adopted without discussion.

Mr McArthur reported for committee re treasurer's surties, that the county had two bonds from Mr Parker of \$50,000 each and another bond from Mr H Parker, Durham, and Mr R McKnight for \$50,000 which were considered ample. The report was adopted.

Report of Roads and Bridges was read by Mr Agnew. With reference to an account from Bruce county for half cost of repairs to bridge on county line, Mr Gordon suggested that a clause be added authorizing the warden to notify the Bruce county council that before any more work this nature is performed the commissioner nearest the locality must be notified. Mr Harness made a statement with reference to the work in question which was done while he was away and while Mr Pringle, his fellow-commissioner, was ill and unable to look after it. Reference was made by the warden, who was chairman of Roads and Bridges last year, to statements made by Bruce commissioners in which they threatened to put Grey in for as much expense as possible and the report was amended so as to anticipate such action, after which it was adopted. Quite a discussion resulted over this matter.

Another subject for discussion was a notice by Mr Watson to pay \$210 as the county's share of a road deviation on the county line between Proton and Melancton, payment to be made to the county of Dufferin direct. Mr Gordon opposed this arguing that such action would be evidence that the county had purchased the road deviation and its maintenance would therefore fall on the county. Mr Shute agreed with Mr Gordon in this view of the matter.

Mr Watson said the townships of Proton and Melancton had passed by-laws with reference to the purchase and maintenance of the road, and this county had agreed to pay half the cost. The cost of two bridges was saved to the county by it.

Mr McArthur said Mr Gordon's proposal to pay the money over to Dufferin through the hands of Proton was like a gaucic saying which he quoted which meant that it was like going to Warton by way of Toronto.

Mr McColman opposed Mr Gordon's amendment, but on motion of Mr Allen it was carried.

Messrs Brown and Doyle moved that the council furnish a messenger boy for the June session.

Mr Gordon—the mover can furnish one as well as the council.

Mr Brown urged that a messenger was necessary to sustain the dignity of the council. The clerk could not properly attend to his duties and run out after motions, etc. Since county paid a messenger \$400 per year. (Laughter.)

Mr McColman was not opposed to having a messenger but facetiously remarked that he thought they could get one for \$200.

The motion was put and carried when Mr Allen, on whose motion the last messenger of council was dispensed with jumped to his feet to remonstrance against the unwarranted expense. He was willing for his part to carry up his papers.

Mr Allen introduced a by-law requiring that auctioneers before conducting a sale shall show their license and announce the date of its issue; also that hawkers, peddlars and chapmen be required to carry a license card where it can be seen by the public. A reward of \$10 was offered by the by-law for every person securing a conviction for this or other by-laws in this behalf.

Mr Agnew began to expatiate on the robberies which were perpetrated by peddlars, especially in spectacles but was ruled out of order. Mr McDonald moved council into committee on the by-law, and was asked by the warden to take the chair but declined, as he wished to speak. Mr Allen proposed Mr Agnew, whom he evidently wished to keep from talking as the time was short. Mr Agnew took the chair.

Mr McDonald said it was an indignity to old auctioneers like Mr Beaton and others to require them to produce their license before they began a sale.

Mr Gordon had no doubt but Mr Beaton for one would be glad of the protection afforded him by the by-law. All auctioneers were not like him, for any member of council could find by enquiry at the treasurer's office that some of them did not pay the fee at all promptly. The by-law was passed in committee and finally passed by the council. It became operative from the date of the passing thereof.

A by-law to adopt as the official seal of the county, the arms of Earl Grey described in these columns some weeks ago, was also passed.

After singing the National Anthem Warden McKinnon declared council adjourned till Monday, 23rd June, at 7 p. m.—O. S. Advertiser.

### Live Stock Market Toronto.

The trade at the Toronto Cattle Market this morning was better than it has been all week. There was only a light run, although much heavier than yesterday, and the excellent demand resulted in a stiffening of prices for almost every kind of cattle. It was expected that there would be a heavy run of cattle this week, but the storm blocked the roads so much that the arrivals have been quite light, and so the demand for the cattle offered has been keen. There are several vessels in port at present and the demand is strengthened by the need for cargoes for them. These factors all combined to stiffen the prices yesterday and to-day they were from 5c. to 10c. higher than yesterday. Sheep are the only ones which are not in good demand at present for export, though good butchers' sheep are still wanted. Good veal calves and export lambs are in good demand.

The market receipts were 53 loads, which included 780 cattle, 472 sheep and lambs, 1,022 hogs and 9 calves. Export cattle are selling well at yesterday's prices for the majority of the offerings and for some particularly choice offerings the price shows an advance of 10c. The prevailing price, while as high as \$5.60 was paid for some of the cattle to-day. Medium ones sold at \$3.50 to \$4.05 per cwt. Butchers' cattle were selling at a slight advance. The picked lots for butchering sold at \$4.40 to \$4.65 per cwt, and picked lots for export brought from \$4.75 to \$4.50 per cwt. Choice butchers' cattle sold at \$3.85 to \$4.30 per cwt, and common to fair ones at \$3.35 to \$3.85 per cwt. Feeders and stockers were steady, selling at the prices which have been in force all week.

Sheep were steady at \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt for export ewes. There is only a light demand for sheep at present. Lambs are still strong and in good demand, selling at \$3.75 to \$5 per cwt. Hogs were steady, selling at \$6 for choice ones and \$5.75 for lights and fats.
