THE CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION.—The Conservative workers of South Grey meet in the Town Hall here on Wednesday next in Annual Convention. Prominence is given to the meeting by having with them W. H. 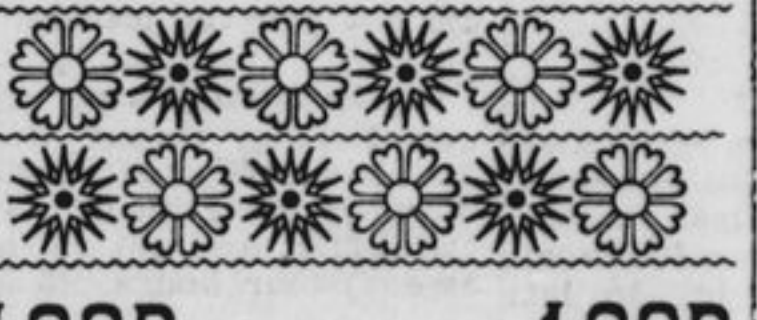

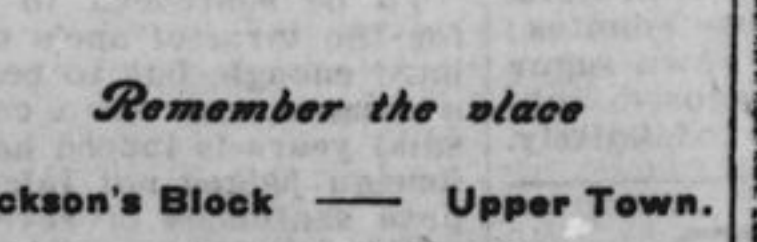
