PRICEVILLE SOIREE.

Once more success attended the workers in the Presbyterian church whose postponed Soiree came off on Thursday evening last under the very best conditions of moon, roads and weather. The attendance was very good, the receipts being over \$55 and the program was excellent, every performer advertised being present.

The choir was ably filled by Dr. Hutton, who is still close to the hearts of the Pricevillians, and who takes a lively interest still in the community he served so long. The addresses of Rev. Mr. Bell, Laurel, and Rev. Mr. Farquharson, Durham, were both of a high class. The former, after a few words of congratulation on his first visit to Priceville (where his son is now Public School principal) announced his topic to be "Mind your own business," and drew from the abrupt injunction many healthy rules of procedure for young and old in all walks of life. Mr. Farquharson spoke on "Gentleness in Scottish character," showing that the quality existed even in the people with such ungentle emblems as a lion-rampant and a prickly Scotch thistle, with a record and a literature of warlike deeds and doings second to no other nation. The humor, the pathos and the pathos of this side of the Scottish character were well illustrated. Rev. Mr. Varley, the resident Methodist minister spoke briefly in a congratulatory strain and Mr. C. Pastor Matheson near the close expressed his personal appreciation to all who had assisted and moved a vote of thanks, seconded by Mr. Rielly, to all who had rendered assistance. Miss G. McLeod accompanied the two Priceville soloists.
