Live Stock Market Toronto.

There was a good day's trade at the Toronto Cattle Market today. The receipts were not heavy, but there was a fair demand and the cattle sold at prices in all cases equal to those of yesterday, and in some cases firmer. The receipts were 44 head, which included 672 cattle, 213 sheep and lambs, 836 hogs and 20 calves. The Expert cattle—Were strong, selling at \$4.80 to \$5.50 per cwt for choice ones and \$5.50 to \$4.80 per cwt for medium.

Butchers' cattle—Were firmer, selling at \$4.40 to \$4.65 per cwt for picked lots, \$3.65 to \$4.40 per cwt for choice ones, and \$3 to \$3.60 per cwt for common to fair ones.

Feeders and Stockers—Were steady, selling at \$3.50 to \$4.50 per cwt for short-keep feeders, and \$3 to \$3.70 per cwt for heavy stockers.

Sheep and Lambs—Were steady, selling at \$3.50 to \$3.75 per cwt for export ewes and \$4 to \$5.25 per cwt for lambs. Hogs—Were steady, selling at \$6 per cwt for choice ones and \$5.75 per cwt for lights and fats.
