PROTON COUNCIL.

Proton Council met at Hopeville on Saturday March 15th 1902. Members of council all present, the Reeve, Jas. H. Corbett, presiding. Wilson - Wright - That the treasurer receive the sum of \$68.00 from Henry Laybourns of the Township of Melancton, being the assessment on his property for digging drain under the municipal Drainage Act, constructed under drainage by-law No. 26 of the Township of Proton. Wright - Wilson - That the treasurer be paid the sum of \$6.00 for one valise and one day book he having purchased and paid for the same by order of Council. Corbett - Wilson - That Wm. Goodfellow be paid \$4.00 for rep. road between Mr. Dugald McLellans and Mr. Samuel Edgertons \$2.75 to be charged to div. 5 and \$1.25 to div. 4. Wright - Wilson - That John H. Richardson be paid the sum of \$1.50 for building bridge on 12 S. R. North of con. 16 and for extra \$2.00 being grant of 1901, and that Donald McCormack be paid \$66.50 for building bridge on con. 18 lot 6 being grant of 1901. Corbett - Shaw - That the sum of \$15.00 granted last year on township Proton and Melancton, be expended this year provided Melancton supplement. Wright - Wilson - That the clerk prepare a by-law for next meeting of Council for the purpose of granting a bonus of 20 cents per rod to help to build wire fences along the roads of the municipality such roads be subject to the approval of the Council. Wright - Wilson - That McCallum and Pratt Owen Sound be paid the sum of \$10.43 for supplies as per bill rendered, and M. World \$10.43 for election supplies. Wilson - Wright - That J. R. McIntyre be paid \$16.50 for printing auditors report. Shaw - Wright - That John McArthur Priceville be paid the sum of \$5.00 for services as arbitrator in a dispute between the Township of Proton and R. J. Porter in the year 1900, relative to the price of gravel. Corbett - Shaw - That Joseph Goleen be paid 60 cents for gravel div. 5. Price - Shaw - That A. McTavish be paid the sum of \$150.00 for building bridge on 12 S. R. con. 6 div. 1 and 2. Price - Shaw - That A. Gillespie be paid the sum of \$7.00 for services as auditor. Corbett - Shaw - That the by-laws for the appointment of pathmasters, fence viewers and pound keepers having been read the necessary number of times, be now signed and sealed. Wilson - Wright - That the sum of \$24.00 be paid to the several persons working on the survey of drain No. 17 as per the engineer's certificate, also that the engineer be paid \$25.00 for work on survey and \$40.00 for plans for work on specifications and \$1.50 post cards for notification of parties interested in the drain. Shaw - Wright - That the Clerk notify interested parties that the council will meet in Hopeville on March 29th at 10 a. m. for the consideration of the report of R. T. West, Township Engineer, on drain No. 17. Council adjourned to meet at Hopeville on Saturday March 29th 1902.
