for some years has resided in town,

in a spirit of independence characteris-
tic of her race. For the brief period of
her illness she was carefully attended to
and her end was peace. Mrs. McKee
was one of the very first settlers on
the 2nd Concession of Bentinck, and her
funeral on Sunday last was attended by
many of her old neighbors from near
the old homestead (Mr. Petherbough's
farm) and also from Rocky Saugeen,
where for some years she lived. She
was a woman of more than average in-
telligence, a great reader, and of con-
siderable force of character. She was
placed beside her husband in Rocky
Saugeen cemetery, a large number bear-
ing testimony to the respect for her
memory by attending the funeral.
Rev. Mr. Farquharson conducted ser-
vices at the house, Rev. Mr. Graham at
the grave. In addition to her two sons
George and John W., both well known
here, she leaves to mourn, three other
sons, J. S. Thomas, (who was at the
funeral), Donald in Massachusetts, and
Guy of —, also, one daughter Mrs.
Harry Firth, of Glenelg. A brother Mr.
Waddell, lives in Toronto.

MR. GEORGE BINNIE.

Liberal Candidate For South Grey.

We take the liberty of reproducing
this week the substance of an article
we published at the time Mr. Binnie
received the unanimous nomination of
his party and which was copied in the
Globe of the time. Since then he has
become known unto a wider circle and
the end is not yet:

"Mr. Binnie was born in Roxburgh-
shire, Scotland, nearly 50 years ago,
and at the age of 11 years came with
his parents to Canada, and is thus
practically a Canadian in education,
growth and sentiment. He has al-
ways resided in Glenelg Township,
and is perhaps the most widely known
personality in the riding outside a few
of the men who have previously tested
public opinion. His work in connection
with the Farmers' Institute and
with South Grey Agricultural Society
is responsible for this prominence, and
it can be safely said that to him more
than to any other one man can be
ascribed the good accomplished by the
former society in its far-reaching opera-
tions. As the efficient Secretary of
the Institute, he has been in touch
with hundreds of farmers. As a direc-
tor of the Agricultural Society, his
services have been in constant request,
and his knowledge of the flower and
fruit departments especially has been
very valuable. Mr. Binnie served his
township as Councillor and Reeve for
many years, and in the County Coun-
cil held the chairmanship of some of
the most important committees. He
was honored by his fellow-councillors
in 1895 with the wardenship of the
county, the highest municipal position
obtainable. Mr. Binnie is a man of
great native intelligence, is widely
read on most subjects and especially
well informed on matters relating to
the farm. On the platform he is
perfectly at home and is a good and
clear speaker. A clear-headed, intel-
ligent man, an enthusiastic and pro-
gressive farmer, a politician trained
roughly in municipal work he is
just such a one as farmers and busi-
ness men in everywhere should feel
honored in supporting. Mr. Binnie is
a member of the Presbyterian Church.
