RE TREES.—Probably it would not be amiss to some of our readers to know the law concerning the trees on the street.—"Chapter 60 of the Ontario Statutes provides that any person who ties a horse to a shade tree in the street, or cuts, or trims or injures such a tree in any way is liable to a fine of \$25 and costs or 30 days imprisonment. The persons in front of whose premises the tree is not exempt from the restriction, Express permission must be had of the Council to trim or in any way meddle with trees planted in the street.

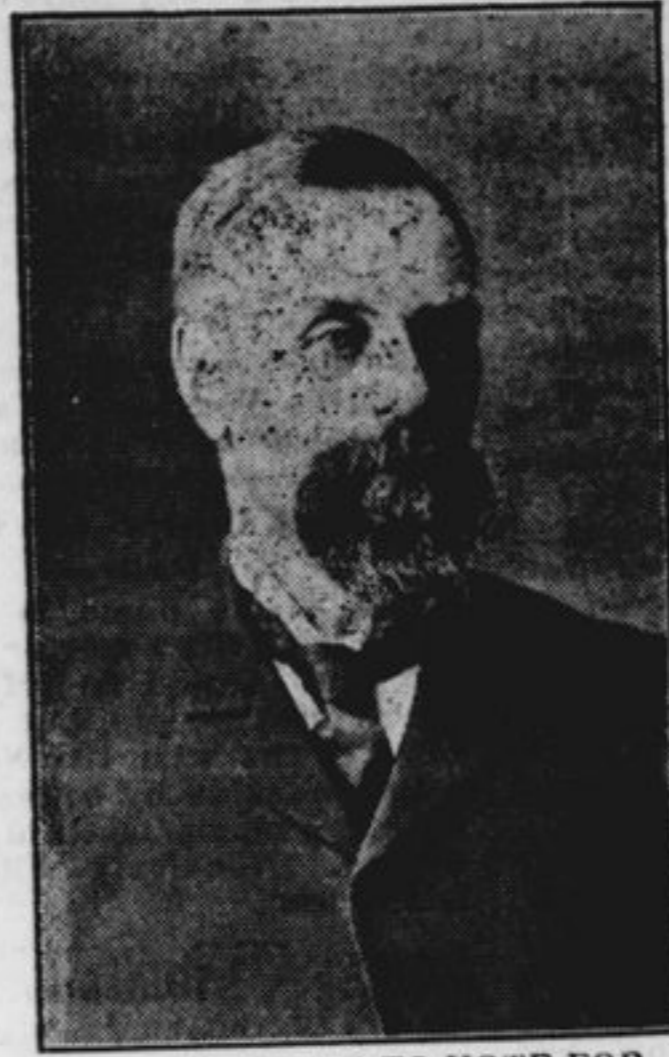
