ANOTHER OF THE PIONEERS.—On
Saturday last at the ripe age of 76 years,
Mrs. Andrew Lindsay, another of the
worthies whose life and toils are em-
bodied in the early history of our coun-
try, passed to the great beyond. As a
parent she enjoyed the deep affection of
her children and as neighbor and friend
her memory will long be kept green.
Mrs. Lindsay (nee Matilda Davidson)
was born in Graystock, Cumberland,
England, 76 years ago and came to this
country in 1856. She was married that
same year to Mr. Andrew Lindsay, who
predeceased her about 7 years ago, and
Rev. Mr. Stewart, the veteran Baptist
clergyman, who may still be seen mov-
ing about the streets of Durham, per-
formed the ceremony. Since then she
has lived continuously on the old home-
stead, 3rd con. Glenelg. Here to them
were born 6 sons and 2 daughters, the
sons being Joseph and John in W.
Superior, Wisconsin; Robert in Ben-
tineck; James in Dakota, Andrew and
Edward at home. Mrs. John Cain,
Maple Hill, is a daughter, the other
being Miss Margaret Lindsay, at home,
who has been a faithful and devoted
daughter during the last illnesses of
both her parents. An only sister Mrs.
H. Collett lives in Brit. Columbia. The
remains were interred Tuesday, in the
Saugenee cemetery, Rev. Mr. Farquhar-
son officiating. A large concourse of
mourners testified to the worth of the
deceased and respect for the living.

FORETOLD DISASTER. — Rev. Irl
Hicks, now becoming well known, as
the author of "Word and Works," a
journal devoted to Theology, Astron-
omy, the home, &c., also publishes an
almanac in which are many elaborate
star maps, storm intelligence, predic-
tions, &c. The recent eruptions in the
West Indies on May 8, compels attention
to his "Astronomy for May" page
101, written last fall, in which is the
following paragraph: "On the 7th day
of May there will be an eclipse of the
Sun, the eclipse being almost total.
But we will again be debarred from
witnessing this wonderful sight, unless
we happen to be sailing on the Pacific
Ocean, somewhere between South
America and Australia. New Zealand
is the only place on the globe, perhaps,
where the eclipse will be observed on
terra firma. This eclipse will, of course,
bring the vast, solid body of the Moon
between Earth and Sun, and the usual
accompaniments of electric storms,
seismic shakes and abnormal tides, will
rise to their maximum in many sections
of our world. The high priests of
astronomic and meteorologic science will
take no official note of these things, but
careful readers of the whole world's
happenings will see that an excess of
such phenomena did occur, within a
period of five days, taking the hour of
the eclipse—May 7th, 8:42 p. m., Green-
wich meantime—as the center of the
period."

BRIBERY.—Last Friday morning the
town woke to find that posters had
been placed around warning "Bribers
to beware" of the severity of the law
passed by the Liberal ministry of On-
tario in regard to corruption at elections.
No one seems to know who posted them
but they form a wholesome reminder in
this good town of the evils of a practice
not unknown here. We do feel sore
however that the proximity of two of the
bills to Rev. Mr. Farquharson, Mr.
Gilbert McKechnie and ourselves seems
to imply that we needed warning, and
we haven't bribed a single person since.
Joe Burnet had one placed on a barrel
in front of his store, so that's worsen
than ours and we hope it will make him
"watch out."

SMALLPOX IN OSPREY.—With the
approach of warm weather, smallpox
again appears to be breaking out. The
Toronto Globe of Tuesday says there
are between thirty and forty suspected
cases in Osprey township, and that
thorough precautions are being taken
against the further spread of the dis-
ease, but that a large number of people
having been exposed to contagion it is
feared that the outbreak will be serious.
The Dundalk Herald of last week
stated that Dr. Scott, of Maxwell, had
advised the temporary closing of Mc-
Intyre post-office on account of a case
of suspected smallpox in the post-
master's family, and that the school at
McIntyre had been closed to await in-
vestigation of the disease by the Pro-
vincial Health Inspector. The Herald
says: "Several in that vicinity are
affected with the disease, which is said
to resemble smallpox in a very mild
form. There is one case on the north
line of which there appears to be no
doubt of its nature." Three new cases
have developed at Huntsville, and there
has been another outbreak in Cayuga
township, Haldimand county.

minutes play in 2nd quarter one en-
thusiastic Hanoverian in close quarters
flung the ball with his hand and almost
immediately after the play-off following
this foul, Durham scored another.
Half time ended 4 to 0, for nothing had
passed Charlie Lavelle, who is an ef-
ficient goalkeeper. At three quarter
time Durham had added two more to
their score, but a whitewash was avoid-
ed by the visitors scoring one in the last
lap.

they failed.
