THE RIDING GOES CONSERVATIVE BY A LARGE MAJORITY.

THE COUNTRY GOES LIBERAL BY A SMALL MAJORITY.

ALL THE MINISTERS ELECTED BY GOOD MAJORITIES.

Almost every election is fruitful in surprises and the election in S. Grey in 1902 is no exception. After a hard and capable fight Mr. Binnie has been defeated by 438 majority, a result we believe not expected by either party. The outstanding feature locally is the very large defection in the Liberal ranks in Bentinck. The other municipalities while showing variations are not markedly different from expectations, though we did expect Glenelg to tie at least. Proton was close but liberal counters there will think the 25 majority should have gone the other way. Dundalk, with only 3 against, and Hanover with 66 for Mr. Binnie must be reckoned good, while the majority of 171 in Durham for the doctor is eloquent testimony to his power and popularity at home. Egremont was expected to go into a three-figured majority but has only 79, while Normanby gave about 50 more than expected, but as we remarked, that Bentinck should give 157 of a tory majority, five less than Normanby, is a complete surprise. How to account for this change we cannot say; rumors of alleged undue influence are around, but it is vain to imagine that this cause alone, if it exists at all, procured defeat. We were much pleased to learn that the Cement Co., on the morning of the election removed all restraint from their workmen as to voting, though it had been rumored the day previous that restraint was being exercised. We regret we cannot say as much for the Furniture Factory, where a number of Liberal votes were unpolled owing to fear of the consequences that might follow. Mr. Binnie, though defeated, can have no regrets for his conduct of the campaign. He entered boldly into the fight, the supporter of a government with a splendid record, the representative of a party which recognized his claims to the position, the representative of a class which has not given him a very generous support. To the winner we extend congratulations on possessing the loyalty of his party to so marked an extent, as well as on the success he has achieved.

The Province. There is matter for rejoicing here that the government has been sustained, though we freely admit the rejoicing is tempered when we consider the result. While we never imagined their defeat we certainly never expected so small a majority as four. There seems to be. Independent candidates in several places have resulted in defeating Liberals and electing Conservatives, but apart from this it is impossible to ignore the stirring up of public feeling indicated in the losses and gains of the campaign. While every individual member of the government has emerged from the melee victorious, in their corporate capacity they have received a blow, but one from which they will recover. We do not believe the reverses are a condemnation of the policy of the government, but the cry "30 years in power" has its effects. At no point will there be pessimism at the prospect of four years more of Liberal rule under the Hon. G. W. Ross, who has in his short term of the premiership shown such marked ability.

OPINION OF HON. G. W. ROSS.

"Although some of the returns were disappointing, the results on the whole are very gratifying. We chiefly regret the loss of such men as Lundsen, Carpenter, McKee, Hill, Pardee, Breithaupt, Mutrie, and possibly one or two others whose elections are in doubt. We are, however, to be reinforced by some new men, whose attainments will retain, I trust, the standing of the Legislature. "One very satisfactory feature is that not a single Minister was defeated. My own return is by a majority more than three times as great as the largest majority I ever had from the constituency. I have now contested for the tenth time and held for thirty years, may be accepted as a gratifying evidence of confidence from those who know me best. "Although the majority is not very large, still, after thirty years tenure of office it is unprecedented in the history of governments under our constitution, that the Government would have a majority at all. "I am not able to say just now what circumstances weighed most with electors in casting their votes. I can simply thank my supporters all over the province, and the candidates elected, as well as those defeated, for the splendid fight they put up against misrepresentation by the Conservative party and by their organs. In this respect the campaign was unique and will, I hope, for all time to come, be so considered. Where local prejudices could not be appealed to the Government was systematically misrepresented. This may have cost us a few seats. "It is delightful to think that the province on the whole has endorsed the policy of building up Ontario. No one could be more gratified than I am that the electors did not fail to remember Ross, and as far as in me lies I shall not forget to remember their best interests."
