RECOUNTS.—These have been taking place now for a week or more and so far no change has been made in the result, though majorities have moved up and down. The closest shave was in Lennox, where Madole's majority of 2 was wiped out and the Returning officer decided in his favor. Barber's recount in Halton has increased his majority. The government stands still 3 ahead, 50 Liberals, 47 Conservatives and one seat, N. Renfrew, which elected the Liberal, Munro, by 429 majority, vacant by death. Monteth. (Con.) N. Perth, has been able to hold his majority of 2 on the recount. N. Grey is in progress as we write and unless the Conservatives gain this seat on the recount, it would seem to be certain that we will have Liberal government for four years more.

Later.—We learn by wire as we go to press that N. Grey recount is over and McKay's majority is reduced to 5.

INDUCTION AT HOLSTEIN.  
Rev. Jno. Little is now Pastor of HOLSTEIN and FAIRBAIRN CONGREGATIONS.

Thursday last was a red-letter day for Holstein and Fairbairn Presbyterians, for after a long vacancy with its anxieties and uncertainties, the congregations were again placed under a settled pastorate, and placed most happily too, for we understand there was absolute unanimity in the choice, an occurrence as rare as it is desirable.

The choice fell upon Rev. Jno. Little, late of Chatsworth and formerly of Dornoch and Rocky Saugeen.

Mr. Little was eminently successful in both his pastorates and gathered around him a wealth of warmth and good feeling that made separation a very trying affair. During the few years he was in Chatsworth, he was largely instrumental in lifting a heavy debt on the church there and so encouraging was his pastorate that they erected a manse second to none in the country. There is reason to believe that spiritual growth kept pace with temporal progress, and it seems to have been no "principle of ease" or financial consideration, but the straight call of duty that led Rev. Mr. Little to leave his good friends in Chatsworth and accept the call to Holstein and Fairbairn.

The day was a delightful one, warm but not hot, sunny sky, roads dustless and consequently the attendance was good, there being no fewer than 14 present from Durham in addition to Rev. and Mrs. Farquharson, while Dromore, Yeovil and other points in the township sent contingents. The congregation of Fairbairn of course was well represented, and other denominations were also in evidence. Mt. Forest also sent a number.

The old guard of Egremont Presbyterians were delighted to find among the visiting ministers the venerable Rev. John Morrison of Cedarville, who did much of the pioneer work that laid the foundations for now flourishing congregations. Notwithstanding his years, he still takes a warm interest in his Master's work, and it must have been gratifying to the veteran to have stationed so near him his young friend of former days. The Owen Sound Presbytery was represented by Moderator Nelson, Desboro, while the clerical part of Saugeen Presbytery for the day consisted of Revs. Aull, Palmerston, Kendall, Con: McCullough, Harrison, Hanna, Mt. Forest; Reid, E. Normanby; Farquharson, Durham; Broad, Cedarvale; and the moderator during the vacancy, Mr. Campbell, of Dromore.

The Presbytery met in the basement and completed arrangements. Rev. Mr. Broad, on their behalf, challenged the congregation and all and sundry to give reasons why the union should not take place. Of course none were forthcoming, and the business of the day commenced.

The Services.  
Rev. Mr. Aull preached the sermon and took for his text "Be ye steadfast, unmovable always abounding in the work of the Lord, &c., and very clearly and ably set forth the advantages to individuals in every walk of life, in holding fast to that which was good and urging that the persistence and enthusiasm exhibited in temporal matters, be carried out in things spiritual. The disadvantages—if any—of a wavering adherence to church and Christian life and doctrine, of fitful attendance at the means of grace, &c., were admirably pointed out.

Rev. Mr. Kendall, who presided for the day, then rehearsed the steps taken officially, to supply the vacancy, and after putting to the next pastor the set of questions authorized for such occasions, and receiving satisfactory answers he declared "in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and of Saugeen Presbytery" Rev. Jno. Little duly inducted to the charges of Holstein and Fairbairn.

Rev. Mr. Farquharson's duty was to address the minister, and after disclaiming any thought of superiority by one minister over another on these occasions, he dwelt on the features of a "Call," showing that a divine as well as human guidance entered into the transaction. The duty of the minister was not only to gather but to build up, to be the helper and the guide of his people in their devotions, but though a ruler and leader was yet to be a steward and a bishop of elders. The old testament type was a high dignity, the new testament idea of the ministry was one of service, illustrated by Christ washing his disciples' feet. He read, and drew many wholesome lessons from extracts from the Confession of Faith regarding the threefold work of leading, devotions, preaching the word and pastoral care. He recommended honesty in expression of statement and remembering that others have convictions, learn to work with them in harmony, to trust and to honor all.

Rev. Mr. Reid addressed the congregation and read the call as a reminder of what they had promised. He gave an interesting reminiscence of college days with their new pastor when he was known as "Godly Johnnie Little." He reminded them a pastor needed encouragement, for he sometimes had
