**EXPORTING PURE BRED STOCK TO THE UNITED STATES.**

Breeders of pure bred stock, desirous of sending animals to the United States, frequently write me for information in regard to the regulations governing the importation of Canadian stock into that country. For the benefit of such breeders the following summary of these regulations is given:—

1. All animals imported into the United States from Canada must be accompanied by an affidavit made by the owner or importer declaring clearly the purpose for which said animals are imported viz:—whether for breeding purposes, for milk production, for work, grazing, feeding or slaughter, whether they form part of settler's effects, or whether they are horses entered for temporary stay as provided by the regulations. Said affidavit must be presented to the Collector of Customs at the Port of Entry who will decide whether the animals are entitled to entry under these regulations and who will notify the Inspector of the Bureau of Animal Industry in all cases where the regulations require an inspection to be made.

2. Horses for breeding, racing, show and sale purposes, for grazing or for work, must be inspected at the Port of Entry.

3. Cattle for breeding purposes, milk production, grazing or feeding must be inspected, and must be accompanied by a certificate signed by a Canadian official veterinarian, stating that no contagious disease affecting cattle excepting tuberculosis and actinomycosis has existed in the district in which the cattle have been kept for six months prior to the date of importation. The owner must present an affidavit that said certificate refers to the animals in question.

4. A certificate for cattle over six months old for breeding purposes, and for milch cows must also show that they have been submitted to the tuberculin test, and found free from tuberculosis, giving the date of testing, with a chart of reaction, and a description of the cattle with age and markings.

5. Any animals may be required to be inspected at the port of entry, and any animal showing symptoms of tuberculosis may be subjected to the tuberculin test, upon instructions from the Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry.

6. All sheep imported into the United States for breeding grazing and feeding must be inspected and must be accompanied by a certificate signed by a Canadian official veterinarian, stating that no contagious disease affecting sheep has existed in the district in which the animals have been kept for six months prior to the date of importation. The owner or importer must present an affidavit that said certificate applies to the animals in question.

7. All swine imported for breeding purposes, grazing or feeding shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by a Canadian official veterinarian stating that no contagious disease affecting swine has existed in the district in which the animals have been kept for six months prior to the date of importation. The owner or importer must present an affidavit that said certificate applies to the animals in question.

8. All cattle sheep and swine for breeding purposes, grazing or feeding when not accompanied by the required certificates and affidavit must be detained in quarantine for one week at the expense of the owner or importer, under the supervision of the inspector in charge. Animals found free from disease at the end of this will be released.

9. All cars used in the transportation of animals must be first thoroughly cleaned and then disinfected by whitewashing with a mixture of lime and carbolic acid before the animals are placed therein. Shippers must see that this is done before the animals are loaded, as unless these regulations are complied with the cars will not be admitted into the United States.

The regulations of the Treasury Dept. of the U. S. direct as follows:—

10. No animal for breeding purposes shall be admitted free duty unless the importer furnishes a certificate of the record and pedigree in the form hereafter given, showing the animal to be pure bred and that it has been admitted to full registry in the American Book of record established for that breed, and that its sire and dam and grandsires and granddams were all recorded in a book of record established for the same breed. An affidavit by the owner or importer that such animal is the identical animal described in the said certificate of record and pedigree must be presented.

**Live Stock Market Toronto.**

There was another day of high prices and good demand at the Toronto Cattle Market to-day, and the dealers generally are of the opinion that this condition of affairs will last for some time yet. The consensus of opinion is that the postponement of the coronation will not have any great effect upon the demand for cattle, as the recent trade has been of a hand-to-mouth character, and English dealers have not been importing any more cattle than they could dispose of almost immediately. Some light falling off in the demand, however, is expected. The prices paid to-day were high for all good cattle, but there were, as usual, a lot of poor grass-fed cattle offered which brought lower prices than the general run of choice cattle. Lambs were in better demand also and scored an advance of 25c per head. There was a good demand for hogs and the price remained steady in the face of large receipts.

Export Cattle—Were steady, selling at the same high prices which have prevailed throughout the week. Choice ones brought from \$5.50 to \$7 per cwt and medium ones sold at \$4.50 to \$5.50 per cwt.

Butcher's Cattle—Were steady, selling at \$5.25 to \$5.75 per cwt for picked lots and \$5 to \$5.45 per cwt for choice ones. Common to fair butchers sold at \$4 to \$5 per cwt.

Feeders and Stockers—Were steady, selling at \$4 to \$5.50 per cwt for short-keep feeders and \$3.40 to \$4 per cwt for heavy stockers.

Sheep—Were steady, selling at \$3.65 to \$3.75 per cwt for export ewes.

Lambs—Were firmer, selling at \$2.25 to \$4.25 each.

Hogs—Were steady, selling at \$6.75 per cwt for choice ones and 6.62 1/2 per cwt for lights and fats.

The market receipts were 68 loads, which included 990 cattle, 715 sheep and lambs, 1,286 hogs and 82 calves.
