



## EGREMONT COUNCIL.

Council met June 24th. Minutes approved.

McFadden—McIntyre—That E North, London be paid \$66.15 for culvert tiles, freight to Mt Forest \$18. Jno Wilson, unloading the same \$1.00. Carried.

Mickleboro—McFadden—That petition presented by J F McKinnon and 29 others soliciting grant for 15th sideroad, con 14, 15 that \$20 be granted for graveling. Carried.

Com'r McIntyre reported that road grader had been used in division No 2 for 14 days. He had spent 2 days in warning out pathmasters in said division and Jas Smith had operated grader 14 days \$1.75 per day, total \$25.37 and 95 cts repairs.

Durant—Mickleboro—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r McIntyre be paid \$4 for his services therewith. Car.

Com'r McFadden reported that grader had been used in his division 34 days operated by Jas Smith and that he had warned pathmasters in said division.

Mickleboro—Durant—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r McFadden be paid \$2 for his services. Carried.

Com'r Mickleboro reported the bridge at P Mutch's finished, covered with rock elm, cost \$60, repairing and filling abutments \$8. Payment recommended to Shiels and Neilson \$68.

Durant—McFadden—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r be paid \$3 con fees. Carried.

Com'r McIntyre reported on road contracts.—H Haw, graveling 457 rds, lots 25-26, con 17 at 54c. 5 ft wide 8 in deep, total \$24.70; D McCannel, taking logs out of crossway, lot 25-26, con 17, \$2.00; Jno Weir, graveling 40 rds, lot 19, con 17-18, 5 ft wide, 9 in deep at 48 cts, total \$17.20; A McDonald, removing tree off road 25 cts and 85 loads of gravel, taken from G Haw's pit.

Mickleborough—Durant—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r McIntyre receive \$3 50 fees. Carried.

Reported by Com'r Mickleboro that A Hamilton had put a new railing on Davidson's bridge, base line, cost \$5.00.

McIntyre—Durant—That foregoing report be adopted and Com'r Mickleboro be paid \$1.00 fees. Carried.

The committee appointed to investigate proposed deviations to avoid building bridges and cutting hills reported as follows:—At rear of lot 14, con 8, no change; after examining base line, con 18-19 recommend that it be surveyed and timber removed and made fit for travel as soon as practicable; at gore "A" con 15, that original roadway be followed and bridge built and hill graded and filled to bridge;

at lot 18, con 6 recommended that the portion of present deviation along the flats be changed and run along the brow of the hill as it is impossible to keep the road-bed in repair by reason of the spring freshets overflowing it and it would do away with a cattlepass and a large culvert therefore the change should be made.

McIntyre—Durant—That report on proposed deviations be adopted and each Com'r receive \$4 con. fees. Carried.

Durant—Mickleboro—That Com'r McIntyre construct a ditch on 25th sideroad, con 21, cost not to exceed \$15.00. Carried.

McIntyre—McFadden—That petition of Geo Snell and 21 others asking a grant to put a railing on hill at lot 22, con 12, resolved that, the matter be left with the Com'r in that division. Carried.

M. Fadden—Durant—That this Council grant \$20 to improve Egremont and Proton townline from the 14th to the 8th con to be expended by the reeve, providing Proton grants an equivalent. Carried.

Mickleboro—McFadden—That Com'r McIntyre expend \$50 on 5th sideroad between the 20th con and the townline. Carried.

McFadden—Mickleboro—That Com'r McIntyre and Durant be a committee to examine Baxter's bridge, con 22 and the bridge on the 15th sideroad at lots 15-16, con 18 as to the necessity of building new bridges and report at next meeting. Car.

Durant—McIntyre—That Com'r Mickleboro be appointed to inspect the pile driving for Holstein bridge and see that the old bridge is removed and disposed of. Carried.

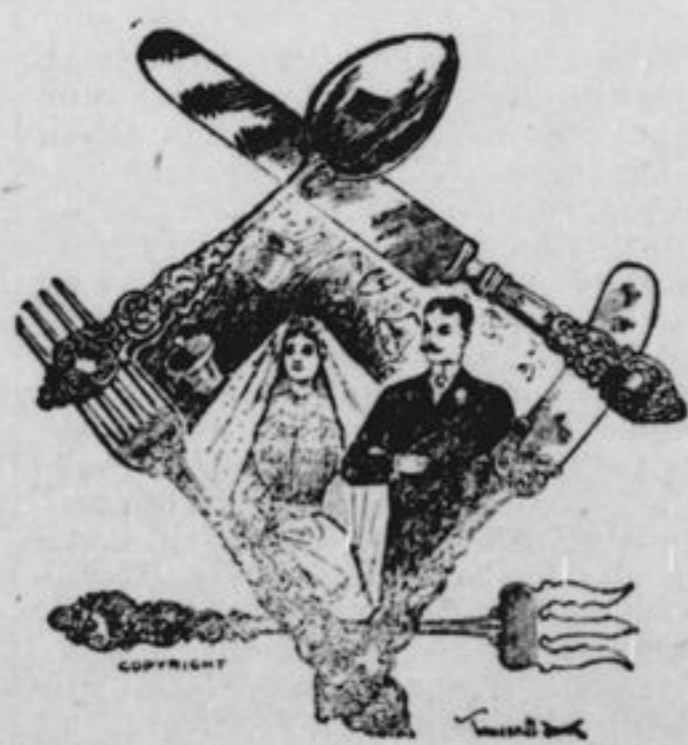
