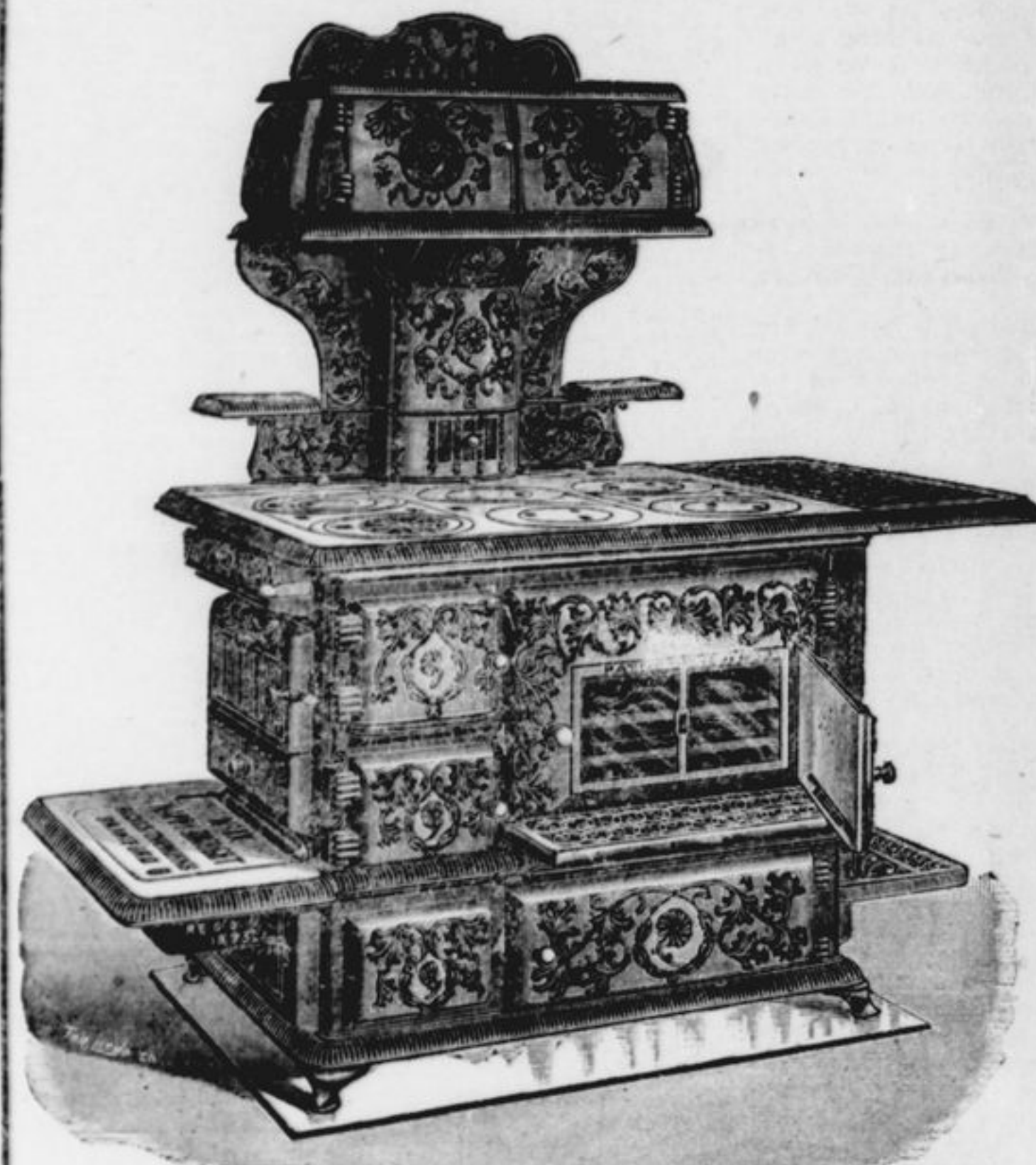

Live Stock Market Toronto.

At the Western cattle market this morning the receipts were 74 carload of live stock, including 860 cattle, 725 sheep and lambs, 1,700 hogs, 70 calves, and 30 milch cows.

With the exception of hogs, trade here was slow, and prices were weaker all round.

Good to choice export cattle in loads was worth from \$5.50 to \$6.50 per cwt.; a few picked lots did fetch a fraction more. For light shippers the price ranged from 4 to 5c per lb. Except for choice stuff, trade was slow.

Heavily good butchers cattle sold, as it did yesterday, up to 5 1/2c per lb as a top figure, but for anything but really good cattle prices were off from 2c to 5c per cwt.

Stockers, feeders, milch cows, springers, etc., are not notably changed from yesterday.

Small stuff was weaker at about 25c per cwt.

The top price for choice hogs is 87c per cwt. Light and fat hogs are 66.75 per cwt.

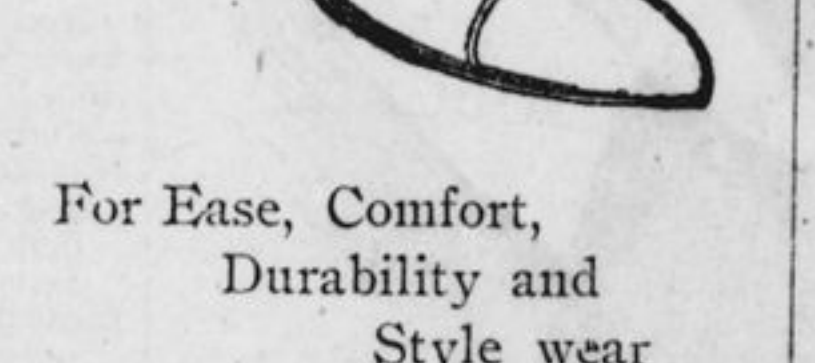
