SALE OF REGISTERED YORKSHIRE FOR BREEDING PURPOSES.

Having carefully studied the conditions and advantages in England, Canada and the United States, of selling by annual public auction, pure bred animals for breeding purposes, a number of the leading Canadian breeders of Yorkshire pigs have decided to establish an annual auction sale, believing that this will supply Canadian farmers with what they require in a more satisfactory manner than the present system of fitting for exhibitions, meeting customers, and selling at the Fall Shows. By fitting and exhibiting animals, a large number of the best males and

breeding, should be represented at this sale.

Special attention is directed to some of the families from which the pigs offered for sale have descended. Representatives from these families have been noted winners in England, Canada, and at many American Exhibitions.

Artemesia Council.

The municipal council of the township of Artemesia met at the town hall, Fieberton on Monday, July 8, 1902. The members were all present, the reeve in the chair. The minutes of session of June 2nd, 1902, were read and confirmed. The committee appointed at May meeting to enquire into the advisability of closing blind line, concessions 9 & 10, at lots 80 to 85, reported that they thought it advisable to close said road. By-law 611 to appoint an arbitrator in the matter of forming a union school section with parts of Artemesia and Osprey was introduced and read a first time.

Gibson—Muir—That by-law 611 be read a second time.—Carried.

Muir—Gibson—That the council go into committee on by-law.—Carried.

Council then went into committee on by-law 611. Mr Thompson in the chair. Committee arose and Mr Thompson presented by-law 611 as filled up.

Gibson—Muir—That by-law 611 as filled up in committee be signed, sealed and entered in the minutes.—Carried.

Gibson—Muir—That the following accounts for gravel used on roads by overseers duly certified be paid. Viz:—Thus Falster, \$6.65; B J Carson, \$7.25; Arthur Johnston, \$2.90; John Hill, \$4.65; John Cunningham, \$5.40; John Wright, sr., \$8.25; W T Pedlar, \$3.80; Wm Davis, \$4.45; M C Scott, \$1.85; George Moore, \$2.40; Jas Watson, \$2.50; J A Thompson, \$5.00.

Thompson—Gibson—That Chas Stewart's account for wood furnished T Maunders by order of council be paid.—Carried.

Muir—Boyd—That W H Thurston's account for advertising road closing and Court of Revision, \$8.14, be paid.—Carried

Boyd—Muir—That R P Legate's account of \$2.50 for grinding grader blade be paid.—Carried.

Boyd—Thompson—That the account of Messrs Lucas, Wright & McArdle for legal services, \$2, and witness fees, \$3.50, in the case of Whittaker vs. Artemesia, be paid.—Carried.

Gibson—Muir—That the report of committee re blind line, concessions 9 & 10, advising closing of same be received and filed, and that the Reeve and Mr Thompson be paid \$1.50 for their services in the matter.—Carried.

Thompson—Boyd—That the acting pathmaster for the village of Engenia be given full charge of the gravel pit in same village and all persons requiring gravel from said pit must apply to him. The said pathmaster to see that parties taking gravel therefrom, shall leave said pit in proper condition and no stones to be left in the road.—Carried.

Boyd—Muir—That an additional grant of \$20 be made to each of the road commissioners for expenditure in their several divisions.—Carried.

Council adjourned.—Advsces.
