Rice was only 26, was well educated, of a good family in Illinois, and a heartrending feature of the case has been the touching struggles of mother and sister to have his sentence mitigated. As long as the death penalty is in use this was certainly an occasion for his exercise, but the case shows vividly what a field of trouble is caused by a swath of crime. In addition to the unknowable prangs of these loved ones, it is no light pain for officials to resist the pleadings of mother-love and condemn a fellow being to die. The gruesome work of the hangman was carried out in the jailyard very few being present, and after the usual inquest the remains were placed in the most expensive coffin in Toronto and taken on the same train as the mother to his old home in Illinois.
