McMillan—Arrowsmith—That the reeve and Mr. Davis be appointed to examine railway crossings on cwitch line railway between Durham and Wilder's lake. This council having been notified that said crossings are in a very dangerous condition, and they are hereby instructed to notify the Co. to put said crossing in a safe condition for travel without delay. Carried.

Davis—McInnis—That the Reeve and Mr. McMillan be a committee to build a combination bridge across Saugeen River at lot 17, con. 5, the bridge now there being in an unsafe condition.—Carried.

Arrowsmith—McInnis—That the Communication from W. J. Hatton solicitor of Owen Sound, re Priel and Barry dispute lay over until next meeting of council.—Carried.

Davis—Arrowsmith—That the petition of Robert Bradley and others regarding the cutting of Baird's Hill be left over till next meeting of Council for further consideration.—Carried.

Davis—McMillan—That Mr. Peter Neil be caretaker of wheeled scraper, and all parties using said scraper must return the same to Mr Neil's as soon as work is done. Carried.

Arrowsmith—McMillan—That Mr. Murdoch be paid the sum of \$6 for attendance on Elizabeth Wise.—Carried.

Davis—Arrowsmith—That the clerk and Mr McMillan be a committee to get a new roof on the hall.—Carried.

Davis—Arrowsmith—That Wm. Weir be paid \$1.00 for removing decomposed meat from Saugeen river at lot 56, con. 2. E. G. R. and the parties who placed said nuisance in the river are hereby warned to remove the same to the Treasurer of Glenelg \$1.00 and save further cost.—Carried.
