

# THE GROWING POPULARITY OF THE FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

In view of the great success of the Farmers' Institute, as a means of Education in Ontario, the Dominion Department of Agriculture has endeavored to co-operate with the various local departments in establishing and improving similar systems in their respective provinces. Trained speakers have been sent to assist in the work in other provinces at the best available men in these provinces have been pressed into service, not only in their own Province, but in others as well. By sending able and observant men from one province to another in this way, we hope to get together a thoroughly capable corps of institute workers, familiar with the agricultural situation and requirements in all parts of Canada.

Prof. E. J. McMillan, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., Superintendent of Farmers' Institutes, etc., has prepared a sketch of the work already accomplished in Prince Edward Island which may be of interest and benefit to those interested in agricultural education in other provinces. According to Prof. McMillan:

"The organization of Farmers' Institutes in Prince Edward Island was first undertaken in June, 1901. At that time the Hon. Benjamin Rogers, Commissioner of Agriculture, assisted by the writer and two experienced institute workers, supplied by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, held meetings of farmers in the different sections of the Province, for the purpose of discussing the advantages of the institute system. As a result of these meetings, the organization of twenty institutes was completed before the end of the year. The Farmers' Institute system of Prince Edward Island is twofold in its aims. It seeks to combine the educational features of the Ontario system with the facilities for dealing in live stock afforded by the old Agricultural Societies' plan. Each organization is a Farmers' Institute and Agricultural Society combined. A Government grant of \$50 is paid annually to each society, which has at least 50 members enrolled, and collects \$40 per year in membership fees. A sum amounting to \$1,000 was expended in this way last year. The total membership up to December 31st, 1901, was 1,824, and the amount subscribed in fees was \$911.50. The receipts of the Institutes from all sources amounted to nearly \$100,000. This money was expended in the purchase of pure bred stock, and in defraying the expenses of lecturers. Thirty-three meetings, chiefly for purposes of organization, were held during the first year. At the beginning of the present year a regular series of institute meetings was arranged and carried out successfully. Several speakers were employed, and various agricultural topics were brought up for discussion, chief among which were, dairying, hog-raising and chicken-fattening. As all of these are

### TOBACCO AND ITS SLAVES.

Tobacco is a thing of mystery. Some of its features and peculiarities are beyond the ken of mortal man. No doubt a gentleman of profound erudition and unanswerable logic might go to St. John's Parish, Louisiana, and after conventional scrutiny prepare a paper proving conclusively that perique tobacco can be produced just as well in Rapides or in Terrebonne as there. No doubt a highly scientific analysis of the soil near Tampico, Mexico, would show that in all chemical respects it is identical with that of the Vuelta Abajo, in Pinar del Rio Province, Cuba. But can any true smoker be converted to either of these beliefs? It is easy enough, perhaps, to prove a thing on paper with formulae, etc.; the question is one of proving it to the satisfaction of the consumer. There is a very great difference. A whole library of calculations and statistics goes for nothing when the untutored smoker takes the weed in his teeth and subjects it to the vulgar test of use.

The question, then, degenerates into one of personal, though doubtless uninformed, taste. There are nameless and indescribable factors in the equation. There are mysteries as astounding as the mystery of life itself.

The most constant and faithful devotee of tobacco cannot tell whether or not his cigar is burning if you blindfold him or put him in a pitch-dark room. He may burn his fingers at the lighted end or he may inhale the smoke. But, in default of one or the other of these expedients he has not the faintest idea whether he is smoking or not smoking. Take him to the baggage or light the room so that he can see and in a second he becomes the expert and can discriminate between the genuine Vuelta Abajo article and the best cigar produced in any other part of the world. No one has ever yet explained it. The fact remains, however, that similarly, no one can give a scientific reason why cigars fully equal to those made in Pinar del Rio cannot be produced in Mexico, with the same soil, the same handlers and with air so chemically identical. Similarly, no one has yet been able to expound the impossibility of raising the real perique tobacco of Louisiana outside of a certain very limited locality. These problems do not yield to science, so far as the smoker is concerned. The mysteries we have mentioned still stare science in the face.—Washington Post.

### REARING THE GUILLOTINE.

How the Work Was Viewed by Victor Hugo.

I heard Victor Hugo give a description of the rearing of a guillotine that he witnessed under the direction of Stimon, in the mean looking red house. The manacled prisoner, more dead than alive, mounted thirteen steps of the scaffold, or was rather, hauled up by Sanson's assistants. Sanson's father—an executioner not from choice, but from hereditary compulsory duty—beheaded Louis XVI. The executioner, whom Victor Hugo saw, "A timorous, unhappy creature," who recited the poet of "an unhealthy intellect" assisted him. What came home most strongly to Victor Hugo's mind was the following reflection: "What right has society to delegate to any human creature a task in fulfilling which he becomes baser than the criminal, and the effects on his moral nature of violent passion, one cannot hold him so vile as the wretch who coolly cuts off his head for wages, and when he has done the job, goes to eat a turkey with his family." Three steps from the scaffold to the red house to order a beef steak and fried potatoes for his breakfast, and then signal from a window to the guillotines at the red house, on the eve of executions.—Paris cor. London News.

### BOYS WILL BE BOYS.

Their Mechanism is Fearful and Wonderful.

It is stated that an English schoolmaster has just completed an exhaustive research into the subject of a boy's capacity for food. Summing up the case, he is frank to admit that, while he found a superabundance of capacity, there was actually little or no limit.
