But can any true smoker be converted to either of these beliefs? It is easy enough, perhaps, to prove a thing on paper with formulae, etc.; the question is one of proving it to the satisfaction of the consumer. There is a very great difference. A whole library of calculations and statistics goes for nothing when the untutored smoker takes the

The question, then, degenerates into one of personal, though doubtless uninformed, taste. There are nameless and indescribable factors in the equation. There are mysteries as astounding as the mystery of life itself.
